Next TGoM meeting scheduled for Wednesday, February 8, 2017



TGoM grant brings Professional Joinery Class to instructor candidates

During November and December 2016, the Education Committee accepted applications from TGoM members interested in participating in an instructor's class subsidized through a TGoM grant. The Guild of Metalsmiths' Board of Directors approved the Education Committee's request for a grant to bring in a guest instructor for a joinery class to be held May 17-21, 2017.

Mark Aspery will come to Minnesota for a 5-day class on Joinery. The applicants will be judged on their qualifications to two major skills and abilities. They must possess the abilities to forge precisely to dimension, be committed to success, and able to follow instruction. Applicants also must have the skills and desire to repay The Guild by instructing classes in joinery in the years to come. This group of individuals will bring the skills back to many of our members. We feel this is the skill most needed to move our education series into the intermediate level. The number of students, the cost of this class, the tools required, and location will be determined soon.

The Board of Directors will review all applications and choose the attendees at the January board meeting.

Check out new (and old) books from TGoM's library!

Book-writing blacksmiths have started sending out copies of their new books to Guild editors to entice the masses. Organic Metalworking - Volume One - The Grapevine, by Lorelei Sims and The Home Blacksmith, by Ryan Ridgway. Skimming through it, there are color step-by-step photographs walking the smith through 40 projects including



tools, decorative items for the home, and farm implements. The publisher states that the book fills in gaps left by other blacksmithing manuals by tracing the history of the craft, while discussing how blacksmithing tools and techniques have evolved differently around the world and providing a foundation in the science of metalworking.

Behind the Guild curtain... Where do tiny hammers come from?

Some of you may have found yourself wondering in the past where the tiny, usually bronze, hammers on the Juaire-Hubler award plaques come from. It would be too easy if Crown Trophy, where the plaques come from, offered them. Instead, The Guild crafts them in a similar if slightly less organized way to Santa's workshop.

Dave Marriette tells a good story of how the first hammers were made for the Juaire-Hubler award back in the late 1990's. If you run into him at a meeting, maybe you can get him to tell it to you. Today the hammers are usually made in one of several ways.

First, the recipient from the previous year of the Juaire-Hubler award always has the right to make the hammer if they wish. This is intended to be an honor and not a burden, so there is no pressure placed on the past honoree, only a polite offer.

If they decline, we have other means to make them. For the last few years the main alternate source for tiny bronze hammers has been Marty Hicks. He restored and maintains some bronze foundry equipment that was donated to the Guild. If we let him know early enough, like this year, he can cast a small hammer head during one of the pours he regularly runs.

The hammer he cast this year had a few pits and small voids and Marty was unsure how well it would finish out (spoiler alert: it finished up awesome!) so we agreed I would make a back-up hammer just in case. This back-up hammer is what ended up being used on the plaque this year due to poor communication skills on my part.

Team effort...

Even this back-up hammer was a team effort. I got the outline of the hammer and handle from Jim Moenck. The bronze I got from Jim Ericksen. It was scrap from their nuclear program at Super Radiator Coil. While not radioactive, it probably originally cost 10x what the same alloy would elsewhere! The bronze wouldn't forge like originally hoped, so I had to do stock removal for the head. I sawed it roughly to shape, ground it with a flap wheel and my belt grinder, and polished it with the belt grinder. There were some challenges: 1) holding on to it with cold fingers in my unheated shop, 2) then my belt grinder tracking wheel that didn't want to stay put and was shrugging belts off, 3) and finally a small grinding wheel spalled off a chunk of rubber while at speed (*Wear your safety glasses, kids!*). Finally, though, the metal work was done. The handle was a little stick of Bocote wood left over from a knife handle from long ago. I roughed it to size on the band saw and finished shaping, sanding and fitting it to the head while sitting on my couch (It was cold out and Heather was out of town). In the proud tradition of procrastinators everywhere, it was finished and the bracket mounted to the plaque the night before the Christmas party.

This is just one example of the thousands of little things that are taken care of behind the scenes to make our group function. If you are a volunteer you know what I am talking about. If you aren't, consider joining the ranks of those men and women behind the curtain.




