
Unique opportunity to learn from a veteran instructor at February 12 TGoM membership meeting!

Make your way to the University of Minnesota campus, U of M Regis Center for Art, Foundry, and Metal Shops on Wednesday, February 12. You'll be fortunate enough to hear Wayne Potratz, Professor and Scholar of the College, talk and show images and video about the Cupola, Iron Sculpture, and the Tatara, Japanese swordsmithing.

Professor Potratz recently hosted an iron ore smelt with Taro Asano, a Japanese swordsmith from Hasima, Japan. He will officially retire in the spring after 44 years as foundry professor at the U of M. He spent those years casting metal and teaching sculpture. His 27th annual (and final) Minnesota Turkey Iron Pour happened on Nov. 26.

Professor Potratz' foundry is located at the Regis Center for Art, 405 21 Avenue South in Minneapolis. Parking will be available in the lot on the south side of the building [between 21st and 22nd Avenue south right off Riverside for \$4.00] or in the ramp across the street from the Regis Center Building. The meeting begins with our customary potluck supper at 6:30, followed at 7:00 by our business meeting and show 'n'tell. After that, we'll be treated to Professor Potratz' presentation.

Struck Tools Workshop

Date Saturday, April 12 2014 Time 9:00 am to 4:30 pm Instructor: Jim Scott

Cost: \$50 Class size: 8

Location: MN School of Horseshoeing



The day will include: preparing a punch, a slitting chisel, and a drift. These are normal length (6 to 8 inches) hand held tools without handles. We will be hand forging as individuals. We will heat treat using oil. Material used will be GM automotive coil spring

stock, presumed to be 5160 alloy.

You will need: your pet hammer, a second hammer for striking tools, hearing and eye protection and proper clothing.

Many of the Guild members have participated in the beginning blacksmith classes.

I (Herb) believe a valuable opportunity for follow on training is the preparation and restoration of tools. Blacksmiths need basic comfort with techniques for restoring and heat treating struck tools. We will focus on the use of color and the heating routine used in heat treating.

For background, go to the meetings and ask those who have participated in the past Jim Scott classes. They will be quite enthusiastic.

Jim will offer this comfort in a one day workshop at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing on April 12 2014. The stock and expertise is supplied by Jim. Arrangements made by Herb Fick.

Bronze Pour: Bronze Casting, Pattern, and Mold Making

Saturday, April 5th, 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm. Pattern Making Workshop.

Saturday & Sunday, April 26th & 27th. 9:00 am to 4:30 pm. Mold Making.

Saturday May 3rd. 1:00 pm - Evening. The Pour. Instructors: Marty Hicks and Don Halverson

Cost: \$120 Class size: 12

Location: Marty's (HIXWERX) Workshop, 2223 Stewart Ave, St. Paul, MN

Participants will be given masonite and plasticine clay to create their artwork, from which a mold will be made. If you have something else that you'd like to cast we can negotiate.

Everyone is welcome to the pattern making workshop which will give you an idea of what's possible to cast. We'll look at examples and talk about ways of creating a pattern to get a successful casting. We'll also give an overview of mold making including sprue and vent systems.

Mixing non-toxic, binded sand, we'll make two-part (cope and drag) molds, and cut sprues and vents. We'll be casting "Everdur", a silicon bronze excellent for artwork and taking a patina.

You will need to bring: eye protection, leather gloves, proper clothing, and any tools you have for working the mold.

Everyone is welcome to the pour the evening of May 3, but there is a limit of twelve to cast a piece. Work will start early in the day but we'll light the furnace at 3:30 pm for an evening pour.

Important: Guild members have first dibs on taking this workshop. **However**, if slots are still open April 26, the workshop will be open to the public. Sign up and get your money in early!

Classes at Tunnel Mill for 2014

April 11, 12, 13: Wire Inlay in Steel, Tom Latane'

Students will start by forging a simple article to be decorated with wire inlay - a medieval key or Viking style sword hilt. While the scale is being pickled from the forging, tools will be forged for chasing the grooves that receive the wire. Demonstrations will show flush wire inlay; raised wire in lay; twisted wire inlay; inlaying of dots. After practicing a bit on scrap steel, students will decorate their forgings.

April 11: Beginning Tinwork, Kitty Latane'

In this class students will have the opportunity to make a variety of traditional items such as cups, candleholders and cookie cutters using tinplate shaped with stakes and mallets. Skills learned include cutting a pattern, wiring an edge, setting down a seam and soldering.

April 12 & 13: Punched Tin Lantern Class, Kitty Latane'

Students will start with a flat sheet of tinplate, trace and cut out a pattern, punch holes in a decorative design, bend and assemble pieces to make a traditional "barn" lantern. Lantern measures approximately 12" tall by 6" diameter. You will each leave with a tin lantern. Check out Tom & Kitty Latane's website, http://www.spaco.org/latane/TCLatane.htm

May 31: Brick Oven Class, David S. Cargo

Learn to build a non-mortared stacked brick oven. This is a hands on class; students will assembly the brick oven (which is approx 3' x 4' wide by 36" tall). It is constructed of 2.5" x 4.5" x 9" bricks.

June 7 & 8: Forge a Viking-Style Axe, John Adams

Students will start with a billet of steel, approximately 1/2" x 2" x 10". We will forge this billet to shape, fold and weld in a steel bit for the cutting edge. Then we will harden and temper. You will shape the eye for the handle and finish the axe. This will all be done in a coal fired forge. Handle will also be furnished. *Prior experience needed; we suggest having had some blacksmithing experience or having taken the beginning blacksmithing class.

June 21: Exploring Gypsy Wagons, John & Carol Adams

We will explore the construction of the Vardo or Gypsy wagon, a horse drawn wagon used by the English Roma people (Gypsies). John has constructed 2 beautiful Gypsy wagons to date, and is currrently working on numbers 3 & 4. Join us for a day of exploring Gypsy Wagon design options and construction techniques.

August 22, 23, 24: Making Damascus (layered steel), Ric Furrer, Door County metalsmith

Damascus Steel Patterning with Rick Dunkerley

Dates: Wed-Fri, April 16-18, 2014; 3 day workshop \$650

Location: Chicago Avenue Fire Arts Center, 3749 Chicago Ave S, Minneapolis, MN 55407

Workshop Description: Meld together layers of mixed ferrous metals to make a billet which will be hammered to create unique patterns of your own choice. Each student will make a billet of Damascus steel to be used for knives or jewelry. Various techniques for patterning will be used to make unique and purposeful patterns. All skill levels are welcome, but some basic metalsmithing will be helpful.

Rick first started making knives in 1984, and after moving to Montana in 1985, his interest in the craft increased. He made stainless steel hunters and utility knives until 1991, when he began forging carbon steel knives and creating damascus steel. Rick joined the American Bladesmith Society a year later. Since receiving his jouneyman smith rating in 1995, Rick's main focus has been damascus steel, particularly mosaic and composite bar blades.

Rick attained the American Bladesmith Society Mastersmith rating in 1997, and in 2002 was selected to the Board of Directors of that organization. He has been a full-time knifemaker since 1996, except for the two month's each fall that he operates as an outtter in Montana's Scapegoat Wilderness. Rick now specializes in damascus folding knives, and also enjoys making Bowie or Persian style straight knives.

Guild educational grants

There is grant money available for Guild members to study intermediate and advanced metalworking techniques.
