Check out our website at http://www.metalsmith.org.

On the home page, in the upper left hand corner, is a menu button entitled "Entrance to the Guild's web forum (click here)" that will take you to the new Bellows. Once there you may go to the upper left of the main Bellows page and either log on or register to participate in the new Bellows. Old Bellows user IDs and passwords no longer work and all must re-register to use the new Bellows.

The Bellows has a section for Guild members only. Only current Guild members in good standing have access to this section of the Bellows. Guild-only announcements, committee reports, back issues of the Metalsmith and other Guild-only information will be kept there.

The first five years of the Metalsmith are now on line in the Guild Members Only section of the web forum, with more being added. 

I Thought Everybody Already Knew This! Smoothing Out a Twist ~ A Technique of Daniel Miller's



Ever made a mistake, or needed a smooth transition at right angles? I made such a mistake recently, forming the basis for this note. On a piece of $\frac{1}{4}$ " x 1" stock, I needed the end to be at right angles to the parent section, but I didn't want a twist. Rather, I wanted a smooth transition.

At a recent class by Daniel Miller at the John C. Campbell Folk School, Daniel told us how to fix this. Upset the twisted section, then hammer back to the desired contour.

The problem with twisting is twofold: First, there are ridges on the edges of the material, and second, there are valleys. If you just hammer out the ridges, there is no material to fill in the valleys. Daniel upsets the twisted area, giving more metal for the valleys.


Dan uses a torch (gas/oxygen) so that he can heat only the section to be upset – heat locally, upset, heat again and then hammer to contour, repeating these steps several times. ♣



A Better Way to Cool Tools

Both paraffin wax and beeswax have an excellent ability to absorb and store heat. Additionally both of these substances do not have a melting point, they have a melting range (i.e. they slowly liquefy over a range of temperatures not a single point like water). This makes wax a great medium for cooling punches, chisels, drifts, and other tools used to work hot steel, as it will cool and lubricate the tool without the risk of hardening it.

I have used a mixture of paraffin wax, beeswax, and powdered graphite to cool my punches and other tools for some time now and have had very good results. You can use all paraffin or all beeswax but I used a 50-50 mix since the paraffin is harder than the beeswax (and I had several pounds of it sitting around). I added the powdered graphite to improve the lubricating properties of the mixture. Graphite is a high pressure high temperature lubricant often used on dies or presses. It works very well on drifts to keep them from sticking. You can also use molybdenum disulfide powder for extreme lubricating applications but it usually costs a lot more.

To make the mixture I add one tube of the powdered graphite (.21 oz / 6 grams) to 2 cups of melted wax and pour it into a metal cup. Note that wax expands 5-10 percent when heated so leave some room in the cup.

Here is some additional technical information. Paraffin wax is part of a family of hydrocarbon compounds known as alkanes with the general formula of nH2n+2 that are solid at room temperature. Paraffin that is liquid at room temperature is known as mineral oil. Beeswax is not a single compound but is a mixture of several compounds with the base compound very similar to paraffin. Both paraffin and beeswax are solid at room temperature and have a flashpoint of 400° F. The melting range of paraffin wax varies with the exact compound but can be classified as low (125° F $- 135^{\circ}$ F), Medium (135° F $- 145^{\circ}$ F), and high (150° F $- 165^{\circ}$ F). Beeswax has a melting range of 144° F $- 147^{\circ}$
