
The Madness is coming! The Madness is coming! Sept. 14,15,16





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Class—Anvil Tools: What's Next?

When: Saturday, Sept. 29, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm Where: MN School of Horseshoeing (Map below)

Fee: \$45 per student

Class size: Maximum 8, minimum 5. There's still room in this class, folks!

Instructors: Jim Moenck and Martin Pansch

If you have just finished the Basics Blacksmithing classes, or you are just having trouble getting started making tooling for your anvil, this class is for you. The capable instructors will teach you how to make some hardie tools to use on your own anvil. Since every hardie hole on every anvil is different, it is important to have your hardie tools fit your anvil.

We will start off the class by discussing tooling for your anvil. Then we'll move into the shop and show you how to make one of the most usefull tools you can own: a hot-cut for your own anvil. Then you will make one for your own anvil.

After you are done with your hot cut, we'll show you how to make a fullering tool. This will be a simple, yet effective tool for making shoulders, drawing out stock and multiple other uses.

Then if we have time, we'll show you how to make a simple "extra hand" for holding stock that extends from the side of your anvil.

This will be a full day's work for you, so come prepared to do a lot of hammering and have some fun with other blacksmiths.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the calss:


Since you will be making tooling for own anvil, you will need to bring your own anvil for sizing. If that is not an option, be sure to measure the size of your hardie hole and pritchel hole. Most forging will be done on the School's anvils unless you prefer to use your own. Bring hammers, flatters, tongs for holding 1-1/4" round and square stock.

Safety Equipment – safety glasses & ear plugs are mandatory. Other safety equipment may include gloves, leather apron, cotton clothing, leather boots.

Lunch Arrangements: Bring your own sack lunch, or eat at any one of the several fine eating establishments in the area.

Beginners Blacksmithing Classes 2012 / 2013

When: Classes are held on four Saturdays from 9-4. Three sets of classes are held this Fall, Winter and Spring. All 3 sets of classes teach the same information. You can choose either the A, B or C set of classes.

Cost: Total cost for the class is \$120. First, you must be a member. If you are not, you can join for \$30 per year. The workbook/study guide is \$15 and the 4 classes are \$105. This covers everything you need, the facility, coal, and metal.

Where: The classes are held at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing, 6250 Riverdale Dr NW, just off Hwy 10 in Anoka near the Anoka Vocational College. See map on page 6.

Why take the beginners basic classes? The beginners basic classes are designed to give everyone the same understanding of the basics, techniques and terminology. The basic classes are required before taking any of the many other classes the Guild offers. This enables those classes to concentrate on advanced techniques without having to spend time on basic concepts.

What you need to bring? Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs an suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal.

Tools: Bring your favorite hammer. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable. We have all the punches, chisels and tools you will be using but feel free to bring your own tools if you have them.

What you will learn: The first 3 Saturdays you will learn the basic techniques including:

Safety Forging Dynamics Hammer Techniques Fire Building
Drawing out Upsetting Punching Bending
Twisting Heat Treating Scrolling Splitting

The fourth Saturday will be self paced to build a few items that will include each of the techniques you learned earlier. Instructors will help guide you thru any number of possible projects. This is a good opportunity to try out all your new skills.

Who are the teachers? The instructors are all volunteers with a wide range of experience, talent, and stories. They range from just finishing the basic beginners class to 30 years experience. There is usually at least one instructor for every two students and many times we have had as many instructors as students.

Who are the students: The students come in all ages and experience. We have had 10 year olds and 70 year olds. There are always a few women in each class. Some students have never held a hammer before. Some students are skilled in other crafts, woodworking, glass, welding, pottery and want to learn more about metal work to work it into their craft. Some students are nearing retirement and want to learn a hobby. All share an interest in learning more about blacksmithing.

Typical day: Classes start at 9 but people usually show up much earlier to get the coffee brewing, have a donut, swap stories or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on to show. We break for lunch. You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant.

CLASS: Wrought Iron Hammers - Tom Latane, October 12, 13, 14, 2012

Students will forge one or more hammers of various sizes from wrought iron faced with steel. Pieces will be drawn down from larger stock, upset from smaller stock, or welded up from numerous small pieces. Students may bring their own wrought iron or purchase some during the class. When a block of the desired size is formed, steel faces and peins will be welded on either end and the eye punched. Decorative details will be discussed before hardening and tempering.
