October's joint membership meeting with MNWWG

Just a note about the October 9 joint meeting at the Jackson Street Round House with the MN Wood Workers Guild. Looks like we'll have multiple demonstrations set up, with Martin Pansch having a go with some simple chest hardware, probably having staged parts for expediency. Also, Bob Brown will man a coal forge and crank out nails for a while. Maybe Bob could also field simple requests from the audience that could be accomplished with 1/4", 3/8" stock.

People could also bring items and merely display them, not having to give an explanation. Especially the demonstrators, displaying a variety of their work, or any work, in front of them at their forging station.

And, Paul Widenhoefer will stage parts for a small carving knife including heat treating, using a small propane forge.

Your Show and Tell will also be a big aspect of the meeting. It's certainly not mandatory that your item(s) be woodworking-related. Show and Tell is still Show and Tell. I just thought items with a woodworking bent might find more appreciation in our hosting this joint meeting with the MNWWG. They too are welcome to bring items. If we get overwhelmed with items, maybe we'll have to put limits on the "Telling" part so as not to hijack everyone's evening. We may very well be having demo's and Show and Tell going on at the same time in different areas.

For your benefit and theirs, I suspect that the demonstrators will get up and running prior to 6:30 pm potluck time, so it may be useful for you to arrive early if at all possible.



Fall Conference demonstrators Clay Spencer

Clay was raised on a farm in North Alabama where his grandfather did some farm blacksmithing. Before retiring from Marshall Space Flight Center as an engineer on the Shuttle Program, Clay started blacksmithing with Jim Batson and took many classes at John C. Campbell Folk School.

He modified the design of ABANA's treadle hammer, making it more useful and able to hold tools in the hammer and anvil and in 1998 designed the Inline or roller blade treadle hammer. Clay teaches classes, leads workshops and demonstrates blacksmithing all over the US.

Clay was active in the Alabama Forge Council as Forgemaster, Conference Chairman and served as writer and Editor of "The Bituminous Bits" for 10 years. He served on the ABANA Board for several years and received the Alex Bealer Award (ABANA's highest award) and Life Membership in ABANA in 1997.

Mark Pearce

Mark started blacksmithing in August of 1983, attended Hereford Technical College for general smithing and then went on to Salisbury COSIRA College for wrought iron smiths. Most of Mark's work in England was traditional restoration blacksmithing involving forge welding, riveting and upsetting to repair or duplicate components on church gates, cathedral railings, which included work at the Sandringham Estate for the Royal family.

In 1993 Mark was recruited to play American football in the CFL, Calgary, Canada. After 5 years of this "trade" he decided to retire from the game and set up a blacksmith shop in Calgary.

Since 1997 Mark has operated a successful blacksmith shop (Mystic Forge.) 4 full time smiths, all originating from Europe, servicing the needs of high-end clients and the general public as well.

Mark Pearce's Pre-Conference Candelabra Class

Dates: Thursday and Friday, September 19 & 20, 2013, Start time 9:00am

Fee: \$170 per student Max students:15

Location: Little Log House Antique Power Show grounds, Hastings MN (map below)

This fall's pre-conference class features Mark Pearce leading participants through making a highly decorative candelabra. Mark Pearce has been a professional blacksmith since 1983. He served an apprenticeship and attended several blacksmithing schools in England. The bulk of his work in England was on the restoration of historic wrought iron gates and railing of cathedrals and an estate for the Royal family. If you have been yearning for a project that is more complex in scope and requires multiple components forged to size and fitted together, but would like the safety net of having a subject matter expert on hand to help you through any "learning moments," then this class is for you. Even if you have made a few similar projects before you are sure to benefit from Mark's decades of experience turning out top of the line architectural iron work.

This class will give participants a chance to work on a number of traditional design features under the watchful eye of a skilled professional blacksmith. The candelabra will incorporate penny scrolls, taper scrolls, blow overleaf scrolls, hot collaring, riveting, mortise and tenons, as well as a tapered, twisted shaft and a raised flat bar for a base.

There is no firm pre-requisite level for this class, Mark says any skill level is welcome as long as they have used a hammer and tongs before. Processes will include forging to dimension, scrolling, chiseling, punching, forge welding and others.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the class. Students will need to bring their own coal forge and anvil for this class. If you either aren't able to move your forge yourself or you don't have a coal forge let us know and we will see what we can arrange. Additionally students should bring: forge tools (rake, shovel, etc); 5 gallons buckets for coal and a slack tub, an ash pail, hammer, tongs, wire brush, flux, twisting wrench, chisels and punches. We'll bring the coal.

Safety Equipment – safety glasses & ear plugs are mandatory. Other safety equipment may include: gloves, leather apron, cotton clothing, leather shoes.

Other Equipment: If you only have an electric blower on your forge you will want to bring an extension cord or two to make sure you can reach an outlet.

Special Instructions: 9AM is when the class will be starting. Please factor in how much time it is going to take to download and set up your equipment when planning your departure and arrival times. Equipment can be set up the evening before. Camping onsite is available at the same rates as for conference.

Lunch Arrangements: Students will need to bring their own lunch. A grill will be brought for those who wish to use it.

Beginners Blacksmithing Classes 2013 / 2014

When: Classes are held on four Saturdays from 9-4. Three sets of classes are held this Fall, Winter and Spring. All 3 sets of classes teach the same information. You can choose the A, B or C set of classes.

Cost: Total cost for the class is \$120. First, you must be a member. If you are not, you can join for \$30 per year. The workbook/study guide is \$15 and the 4 classes are \$105. This covers everything you need, the facility, coal, and metal.

Where: The classes are held at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing, 6250 Riverdale Dr NW, just off Hwy 10 in Anoka near the Anoka Vocational College.

Why take the beginners basic classes? The beginners basic classes are designed to give everyone the same understanding of the basics, techniques and terminology. The basic classes are required before taking any of the many other classes the Guild offers. This enables those classes to concentrate on advanced techniques without having to spend time on basic concepts.

What you need to bring? Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs and suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal.

Tools: Bring your favorite hammer. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable. We have all the punches, chisels and tools you will be using but feel free to bring your own tools if you have them.

What you will learn: The first 3 Saturdays you will learn the basic techniques including:

Safety Forging Dynamics Hammer Techniques Fire Building
Drawing out Upsetting Punching Bending
Twisting Heat Treating Scrolling Splitting

The fourth Saturday will be self paced to build a few items that will include each of the techniques you learned earlier. Instructors will help guide you thru any number of possible projects. This is a good opportunity to try out all your new skills.

Who are the teachers? The instructors are all volunteers with a wide range of experience, talent, and stories. They range from just finishing the basic beginners class to 30 years experience. There is usually at least one instructor for every two students and many times we have had as many instructors as students.

Who are the students: The students come in all ages and experience. We have had 10 year olds and 70 year olds. There are always a few women in each class. Some students have never held a hammer before. Some students are skilled in other crafts, woodworking, glass, welding, and pottery and want to learn more about metal work to work it into their craft. Some students are nearing retirement and want to learn a hobby. All share an interest in learning more about blacksmithing.

Typical day: Classes start at 9 but people usually show up much earlier to get the coffee brewing, have a donut, swap stories or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on to show. We break for lunch. You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant.



Wire Inlay Class

Instructor: Tom Latane' Date: Saturday, Nov. 2, 2013, Time: 9:00 am Location: Marty Hicks Workshop (Hixworks), 2223 Stewart Ave, St. Paul, MN Cost: Max students: 8. Minimum students: 4

We have a real treat for you this time. Tom Latané has offered to take some time out of his busy schedule and teach us a thing or two.

The class will focus on wire inlay in steel. Students will chase grooves in the metal and then chase the bottoms of the grooves square. The two corners thus created will be chased to form an undercut channel. The upper edges of the channels will be chased and filed to create grooves of even width. Copper wire will be planished into the grooves so that the softer metal forms to fit the undercut and it locked in place. Surfaces will then be filed smooth leaving a pattern to show the differ color of the metals.



This is an example of Tom's silver wire inlay on an axe head. Note: we will not be making or inlaying axes in this class.

Copper wire will be provided to practice inlay on flat pieces that can be held firmly. Students may bring finished pieces to inlay after some practice. Provisions should be made for holding projects securely while chiseling and inlaying. Practice will be with copper wire but students may bring sterling wire of 18 gauge if they wish. This can be purchased from Rio Grande Jewelers Supply.

This is an intermediate to advanced class. Students will be expected to be able to forge and heat treat tool blanks on their own before coming to class. There will not be time in class to forge the required tools.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the class. Students will be expected to bring 18 pre-forged struck tool blanks to class. The blanks should be 3" long and from 3/8" round or square stock that you can harden with confidence. Detailed instructions on rough shapes for the tools blanks will be sent to the registered students. Final grinding will be done in class. Students will also need a light, soft face hammer for striking tools. This hammer should be light enough that thousands of blows will not be tiring. A cheap Chinese ball pein will likely need no softening. Additional tools include: A mill file, sand paper, paper, pencil, Sharpie TM. Students may consider bringing a supplemental light source or other visual enhancement aids as needed.

Safety Equipment: safety glasses & ear plugs are mandatory.

Other Equipment: We may also need a few additional leg vises and grinders with fine enough stones/belts for the final grinding on the struck tools but we'll sort that out among those who sign up.

Lunch arrangements: Either bring a bag lunch with you or money to dine at some of the fine scarfing establishments in the area.

Tom Latane' Candle-Holder class October 11, 12, and 13, 2013

Students will create a two-candle chandelier with a saw tooth trammel for adjusting the hanging height. Teeth of the trammel over the edge of the anvil. Candle cups will be forged and riveted through drip pans with raised edges into the cross arms. The junction of the center trammel and the cross arms (mortise and tenon) will be decorated with delicate scrollwork. These scroll, drawn out and forge-welded together in pairs, can be simple or more complex depending on the desires and skills of each student.
