Your favorite hammer and water to drink. Bring:



Clock Theory and the Blacksmith

Saturday, October 15, 2016, 9:00 am to noon

Location: Jackson Street Roundhouse, 193 Pennsylvania Avenue East, St. Paul MN

Cost: \$15 per student **Instructor: Susan Wood**

This class will include a lecture and images on how clock mechanisms are designed and built, including the influence of the blacksmith in early clocks and tools. We will cover the evolution of escapements from foliot to pendulum to balance wheel. How sources of power influence the mechanism with weights springs fusee and Geneva stops. We will do the math of gear ratios and tooth profiles. There will be a look into time trains, chime trains, and strike trains and how they work together. We will look at how early clocks were hand-built, then the first machines built by blacksmiths that clockmakers used. This will be a 2 to 3 hour class with lots of close up

looks at different clocks and much room for questions and inspiration.



Tongs Class

Saturday, Dec. 3, 2016, 9:00 am - 4:00 pm

Cost: \$40 per student Maximum students: 8, Minimum 4

Tongs, while deceptively simple looking, contain a lot of considerations in making them. They should fit the work, fit your hand, be long enough but not too long, sturdy enough but not too heavy, and constructed in a way that lasts despite heavy use. This class will look at these factors and more as we learn to make tongs using the classic 3-shoulder method. Those with less experience will be encouraged to stick with flat bit tongs but the modifications needed for bolt, pick up, box jaw, etc will be demonstrated and can be tried by the more bold. Students should have already completed the beginner class or equivalent. Techniques involved will include half-face blows, forging to dimension, drawing, punching and riveting. We might play a little with striking for each other. The goal is for students to leave with the knowledge needed to make any tongs they need in the future with little more than a hammer, anvil, forge and punch.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the class. Your favorite blacksmithing hammer, ¼ to 3/8" round punch if you have one. Flatters, sledge hammer, and hot rasp may also be used but don't go buy them just for the class.

Safety Equipment – safety glasses & ear plugs are mandatory. Other safety equipment may include: gloves, leather apron, cotton clothing, leather shoes.

Handled Struck Tool Class

Saturday, December 10, 2016, 8:00 am to 5 pm

Instructor: Jesse Gavin (lead) supported by Dave Gavin, Herb Fick, and others

Cost: \$65

Minimum 6 students; maximum 8

Location: Minnesota School of Horseshoeing (map page 7)

The tools made will be punches with a wire handles and chisels with wire handles. We will use treadle hammers. (Find out if you really need one of these by trying them.) Tools for the treadle hammers will be supplied.

Steel will be 5/8 and 3/4 inch round 4140 for the punches and chisels. Handles will be fabricated from 1/4 and or 5/16 round CRS.

The exercise will include forging and basic heat treatment of the tools. We forge in the morning, heat treat and install handles after lunch.

We've accepted that most of the time is spent focusing on understanding the heat treat process. There will be enough stock so we can encourage you to make a couple of serious mistakes and still go home with real tools to use or offer for the next "iron in the hat".

Power grinders are supplied by Duggan, Gavin, BtW © and Fick. We still have a couple of belts supplied by our abrasive friends at 3M.

Bring your favorite hammers, tongs suitable for the stock if you have them, and eye and ear protection. Bring your basic safety gear (leather, cotton, gloves, and safety shoes). Last year we used three different treadle hammers for the eight students.




