Update your 'Guild gear'!



Handled Struck Tool Class

Saturday, December 5, 2015, 8:00 am to 5 pm Instructor: Jesse Gavin (lead) supported by Dave

The tools made will be punches with a wire handle and chisels with a wire handle. We will use treadle hammers. (Find out if you really need one of these by trying them.) Tools for the treadle hammers will be supplied.

Steel will be 5/8 and 3/4 inch round 4140 for the punches and chisels. Handles will be fabricated from 1/4 and or 5/16 round CRS.



The exercise will include forging and basic heat treatment of the tools. We forge in the morning, heat treat and install handles after lunch. We've accepted that most of the time is spent focusing on understanding the heat treat process. There will be enough stock so we can encourage you to make a couple of serious mistakes and still go home with real tools to use or offer for the next "iron in the hat".

Power grinders are supplied by Duggan, Gavin, BtW © and Fick. We still have a couple of belts supplied by our abrasive friends at 3M. Bring your favorite hammers, tongs suitable for the stock if you have them, and eye and ear protection. Bring your basic safety gear (leather, cotton, gloves, and safety shoes). Last year we used three different treadle hammers for the eight students.

Shipping anvils: An adventure in freight!

I have been looking for a specific anvil for awhile, a double-horned "Mousehole." Then a little while ago Jim Ericksen and his mad Facebook skills found a beauty. The catch was it was at an antique store in Searsport, Maine and the owner doesn't typically ship things, so it was left to me to figure out the freight.

I thought I would share what I found here both to maybe help others that find themselves in similar situations and maybe to get a tip from anyone who might have had better results than what I found. For purpose of comparison the anvil's vitals are 200 lbs, 27" long, 10" high and 9" wide at the

I checked the UPS freight option first. Door-to-door service with a lift gate at the pickup site it would cost an eye-popping \$1181.11! Alternatively, if I could get someone to drop it off at their service center in Manchester, NH I could get it dropped off at one of their centers in Minnesota, either Coon Rapids or Minneapolis, for \$271.80. A better deal, but since Manchester was a two hour one-way drive from where the anvil currently is, still a non-starter.

Next, on Jim Ericksen's suggestion, I tried Fastenal. I didn't know before but to off-set the cost of driving empty delivery trucks around, they will move freight between stores for a modest cost. In my case from the Fastenal just outside Bangor, ME to the one in Waconia, MN for just \$100. With this option I still have to get the anvil strapped to a pallet and moved the 30 miles from where it is to the Fastenal, but for the difference in cost and distance definitely the front runner.

Figuring I should probably get at least a third bid, I went to www.Freightcenter.com. It is a freight broker that checks multiple companies. You enter in the vitals of your package in their website, and it gives you the prices from a number of different vendors. For a door-to-door service with a lift gate, the pick-up prices started at \$380.64 and went up to \$767.74. Interestingly, UPS Freight was listed with the second best price of \$398.87 of the seven companies listed. I still haven't figured how that squares with the quote straight from UPS.

A few notes about Freight Center's site. First you have to create an account before it will let you get a freight estimate. Once you do, it is a pretty easy process with a few boxes to fill out and a menu to help you figure out what class freight your item is. At the bottom is a menu to select what kind of packaging your item is in and lists different pallet sizes in addition to things like crates, box, and unpackaged. I found that if you select "unpackaged" you get a screen saying that one of their shipping con-

> sultants will be in touch with you shortly to help. I hit the back button and redid the estimate using a custom pallet dimension just a little bigger than the anvil.

As these prices were all a bit north of Fastenal's, I figured I was done with Freight

Center for this exercise. The next morning, however, I got a call and email from a polite young woman wanting to help me arrange freight. I emailed her back explaining the situation and what price and service Freight Center would have to be beat, and she admitted she probably couldn't in this case, but she invited me to try back for any future freight needs.

That is where things sit now. The anvil is still in Searsport waiting to hitch a ride to Bangor. My contacts in that area are a little sparse so right now my best prospect is getting it on a pallet and to Fastenal is the antique store owner who I bought it from but he can't do it until he closes his shop at the end of October. To make it worth his time it may actually cost me as much to get it the 30 miles to a Fastenal than the remaining 1600 miles to Waconia! Even so it will probably still be a fraction of what it would have cost to buy it on eBay and I am not in a particular hurry, so I'm still pretty happy.


