We will have the usual potluck - bring a dish to pass. We'll eat at 6:30.


Parking is ample either in the lot, on the street or across the street at Fleet Farm.

#### **GUILLOTINE-MAKING CLASS**

Saturday, March 10, 2018,

Location: Larry Wasmund's shop, Cleveland MN

Cost: \$110 per student

Students in this class will construct a guillotine style tool for fullering opposing faces of a piece of stock. The final design is still in the works and will be shown on the website and in the February and March Forums. The project will use little or no forging and will involve drilling, tapping and welding.

## BOLT JAW TONGS CLASS - 3/4" or 11/4"

Saturday, March 17, Start 8 am, end 5:00 pm MN School of Horseshoeing

Cost: \$75 per student

Max 8 students, minimum 5 students

**Instructor: Dave Gavin** 

Class to teach the process of making Bolt Jaw Tongs. Using 1/2" x 3/4" stock to hold 1 1/4" square or round stock. There will be substantial amounts of drawing out the reins by hand. This is the tong size required to hold the parent material for making one of the anvil blocks (see photo). The anvil blocks will be taught in a future intermediate level class. Alternatively – the student might choose to make a 3/4" Bolt

level class to make the slot punches.

Jaw Tongs – this size of tongs is used in the intermediate

This class will focus on the hardware needed to equip a wooden tool box. Parts include hinges, bale handles with plates and cotter pins, a hasp and staple and, of course, nails. The first day students will concentrate on making welded butterfly hinges and hasps. The second day students will be taken through forging bale handles, plates, cotter pins and nails. Solid intermediate level skills needed. Students should be familiar with forge welding, have good hammer control and be able to control where they spread their steel. Demonstration will be for basic functional hardware designs but students may choose to more decorative styles as their abilities and tolerance for risk allow.

**Required Tools:** Your favorite blacksmithing hammer, tongs for handling 1/8" flat stock, 1/2", 3/8", an ½" square and round stock, a selection of files (a ½" to ½" square bastard is handy), about 1/2" wide cold chisel, 3/16" round or square punch, hacksaw, wire brush, and any other tools you think might be useful.

**Other Equipment**: Flux, drifts, nail headers, and hinge bending jigs will be provided

**Safety Equipment**: safety glasses & ear plugs are mandatory. Other safety equipment may include: gloves, leather apron, cotton clothing, and leather shoes.

#### STRUCK TOOLS WORKSHOP

Saturday, March 31, 9:00 am to 4:30 pm MN School of Horseshoeing

**Cost: \$60** 

Class size: 8 max, 5 minimum

**Instructor: Jim Scott** 

Prepare a punch, a slitting chisel and a drift using approximately 5/8 inch round stock. We will fabricate normal length (6 to 8 inches) hand held tools without handles, and heat treat using oil. We will have trainers who offer all kinds of help including striking. Material used will be GM automotive coil spring stock, presumed to be 5160 alloy.

Students should have completed the Beginning Blacksmithing course or have suitable background experience.

This workshop is a valuable opportunity for practical handson training in the preparation and restoration of tools. Blacksmiths need basic comfort with techniques used when restoring and heat treating tools. We will focus on the use of color and on the use of oil to deter- mine grain size, hardness and temper. This class comes highly recommended by previous participants! Don't miss this opportunity to learn about heat treating from the experts and walk out with useful tools!

**Required Took:** your pet forging hammer, a second hammer for striking tools, hearing and eye protection and proper clothing, tongs if you have them. A variety of Guild hammers will be available for your trial.

#### WIRE INLAY CLASS

Saturday, April 14, 9:00 am Jackson Street Roundhouse Cost: \$55 (\$65 for non-guild) Class size: 8 max, 4 minimum

The class will focus on wire inlay into mild steel. This is a technique that can be used to add decorative elements to many of your projects. Students will chase grooves in the metal and then chase the bottoms of the grooves square. The two corners thus created will be chased to form an undercut channel. The upper edges of the channels will be chased and filed to create grooves of even width. Copper wire will be planished into the grooves so that the softer metal forms to fit the undercut and it locked in place. Surfaces will then be filed smooth leaving a pattern to show the differ color of the metals. Copper wire will be provided to practice inlay on flat pieces that can be held firmly in a vise.

This class will concentrate on the basics of the straight lines, curved lines, and dots. We'll cover both wire that is filed flush with the surface of the steel and left as a raised bead.

**Required Equipment:** A basic set of small chisels will be provided for students for use in the class. Those over achievers who want to make their own prior to class can request detailed descriptions of the needed tools. Students will also need a light, soft face hammer for striking tools.

This hammer should be light enough that thousands of blows will not be tiring. A cheap Chinese ball peen will likely need no softening. Additional tools include: A mill file, a hack saw, sand paper, sharpening stones (a diamond lap plate works well), paper, pencil, Sharpie TM. Students may consider bringing a supplemental light source or other visual enhancement aids as needed.

#### **TOM LATANE': DOOR KNOCKER SCROLL MAY 22-24**

Students will learn a number of decorative techniques to apply to a basic scroll shaped door knocker. They will forge a snub end scroll at the lower end of the stock above which will be hot chased a bead. This bead will be divided into rope segments cold, after the scroll has been given its final shape. In the center of the bar will be forged and filed a lamb's tongue profile. There will be a demonstration of cold chasing a leaf in this mass. The upper half of the bar will be chased with ribs on the front below and the back above, so that they appear continuous when the scroll is rolled.

There will be a boss forged against which the knocker will strike and a clevis hinge, half of which will be mortised through the upper scroll. A single escutcheon may be forged for the knocker or separate escutcheons for the boss and hinge elements.

Depending on the proficiency of the student it may be necessary to choose between chasing the leaf or forging the hinge or boss.





## <u>JEFF HARPER</u>: A BEGINNER'S CLASS IN FORGING PATTERN WELDED STEEL BILLETS ("DAMASCUS") JUNE 2-3

This 2-day introductory class will take you through the basics of pattern welded/damascus steel to make either a blade or small tool. On the first day, using high carbon steel, we will focus on material preparation and forge welding a small billet by hand. Our following larger billets will be done with the help of the power hammer. Pattern manipulations such as random and twist will be followed by raindrop and ladder as student proficiency allows. In the evening we will go into forge welding billets of steel cable and chain. Day two will consist of shaping, polishing, heat treatment, and etching. We will also be continuing work begun the previous day.

Students will go home with a couple billets of their own creation to use in other courses and projects, as well as the knowledge to make more.

#### KJ GROVEN: TRADITIONAL NORWEGIAN KNIFE AND SHEATH JUNE 15-17

Acclaimed Norwegian knife-maker Kjetil Groven will be teaching a 3-day class, forging traditional Norwegian 3-layer knife blades. You will heat-treat and grind the blades, then set them in a wood handle that you will shape and stain. If time allows, you will make a traditional leather sheath; if not, Kjetil will demonstrate all the steps so that students can finish the sheath on their own, if desired. (Last year everyone made several blades, one or two handles and a sheath, but it required working into the evening hours).




