



New to gas welding? Just want to brush up your basic skills? Guild legends Myron, Bill, and Dick have taught this class for several years, focusing on safety and hands-on learning. Students will be working at individual stations on a shared workbench, with equipment and stock provided. If time permits, bonus demonstrations by Bill and Myron will show advanced techniques and uses of the oxyacetylene torch.



Safety gear for sparks and melted/hot metal: common safety garb (leather footwear and cotton, leather, or wool clothing—no cuffs or frayed edges) plus eye protection with a #5 lens: goggles or glasses will work but a face shield with the #5 lens is highly recommended. If you wear corrective lenses, bring those, too. Cloth cap is optional, gloves are recommended.

# **Box Tongs Class**

Bring your favorite hammer and a file

Safety Equipment – Cotton clothing, gloves, hearing protection, safety glasses.

Lunch arrangements: Bring a bag lunch or travel to fast food.

This class will teach those in attendance how to make a box style tongs. A box type tong gives you the most control in holding rectangular stock. We will be starting with  $\frac{1}{2}$  x 5/8 stock and making a tongs to hold a  $\frac{1}{2}$ x 1 inch stock. There will be substantial amounts of drawing out on the reins and bit of this tongs, the students should have the dexterity for forging heavier stock. students must know how to direct the movement steel with a cross peen, drawing out, and riveting. Everyone will go home with a functioning tool.

Learn to make wheat stalks w/leaves as elements of a sculpture. Full sculpture can be completed depending on time.

Required tools: gas forge, anvil, leg vise, hand files, scrolling tongs, tongs to hold 1/8" – 3/8" round stock and 1/8" flat stock, forging hammers, small sharp cross peen hammer, grinder w/ grinder wheel, cut off wheel and sanding wheels, wire brush, brass brush, veining tool for leaves, diverging 'V' tool, needle nose pliers or vise grip 6LN, hand held torch (oxy propane or acetylene) & other favorite

tools. Optional tools (bring if you have): touch mark

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# Forge Welding Class

Saturday & Sunday, November 17 & 18, 9 am to 5 pm each day

Forge welding. So, you've seen it done. It looked so easy. Why doesn't it work for me, you ask? David will seek to dispel the mythical mysticism that seems to surround this technique, and give you the tools you need to begin forge welding. Like many things there is no magic bullet. It is a compilation of doing everything right, not just one thing.

Starting from the ground up learning to manage heat, you'll begin with some basic welding, and as you gain some experience move on to a few more advanced welding configurations. Some solid basic forging experience would be beneficial.

Safety Equipment: The usual. Eye and ear protection. No flammable clothing. Leather work boots. Since we are forge welding and there will be more sparks than usual, students should dress with that in mind. Bring an apron if you have one.

Tools and Equipment: As part of the cost of the class, students will be provided with their own wire brush and a 1-lb. can of EZ Weld.

**Lunch arrangements:** Bring a bag lunch or visit one of the area restaurants.

# Handled Struck Tools Workshop

Saturday, Dec. 1, 8 am to 5 pm

Location: MN School of Horseshoeing (map page 7)

Instructors: Jesse (lead instructor) and Dave Gavin, others

Cost: \$85 Minimum six students Maximum eight.



Handled struck tools

The tools made will be punches with a wire handle and chisels with a wire handle. We will offer the option to use treadle hammers supplied by the teaching staff. (Find out if you really need one of these by trying them.) Last year we used 3 different treadle hammers for the eight students. Tools for the treadle hammers will be supplied. Steel used will Color tempered chisels be 5/8 and 3/4 inch round 4140 AN for the punches and chisels. Handles will be fabricated from 1/4 and or 5/16 round CRS.

The goal of the workshop is to produce students comfortable with the process of forging and heat treating tools from tool steel. The secondary goal is to have the students comfortable with the use of treadle hammers. We forge in the morning, heat treat and install handles after lunch.

We've accepted that most of the time is spent focusing on understanding the heat treat process. There will be enough stock so we can encourage you to make a couple of serious mistakes and still go home with real tools to use or to offer for the next "iron in the hat".

Power grinders are supplied. Bring your favorite hammers and tongs suitable for the stock if you have them. Bring your basic safety gear (leather, cotton, gloves, eye and ear protection and safety shoes). This class has been going annually for quite a while and has always filled. Credit for that goes to Jesse and Dave.

# **Fireplace Tools Class**

This will be a creative class making tools for a fireplace or fire pit. You will create a fire poker, an ash shovel, and a hearth broom. The stock will be 3/8 square stock and there will be many handle choices from coils to animal heads to bottle openers incorporated into the handles. All students get enough materials for three tools and a wall bracket. Time should allow finishing two, and most will complete all. Full registration details on website or in November Forum.



# New books acquired for TGoM Library!

During the fall conference, we acquired a number of new books for our library. Two are "how to" books for different types of beginners, one is on hydraulic forging, and the other one is on one guy's craftsmanship. Also, ten books from the estate of Corky Kittelson were donated to the library by John Yust.

*Cyril Colnik, Man of Iron* is the "I really wish I could do that" book. Written by Alan J. Strekow. Our 28 year old daughter was impressed when she saw what Cyril could do in his 20's. He did a lot of iron gates, fences, chandeliers, lamp and plant stands for the beer barons and other wealthy families of the Milwaukee area. There are a lot of color photographs of different interior and exterior projects that he completed, and who they were made for. His Master Piece is truly inspiring. Color, 202 pages.



Hydraulic Forging Press for the Blacksmith written by Randy McDaniel starts by comparing a power hammer to a press, and the difference that each one has on a similar piece of metal. Randy talks about safety, if you should to build or buy, examples of different types of tooling and dies, how to forge pipes and tubing and the like. He also has a gallery of work that he did with his press, and other presses that individuals around the county have made. Color, 192 pages.

Wayne Goddard's \$50 Knife Shop. Wayne writes about how he started, what kind of tools he used in the beginning, and how he worked around different problems. He explains the two ways of making a knife-by forging, or by stock removal (grinding). Backyard heat treating is the next section, followed by primitive workshops, damascus steel, home made grinders, and he finishes with gigs and fixtures. An excellent book for someone who would like to make knives, but doesn't have the experience or equipment. Mostly color with 190 pages.

The Blacksmith's Project Book. The author stresses that this is an intermediate and advanced project book, with 21 projects from European Masters. Author Antonello Rizzo followed these craftsman and showed how they made their projects. Each step is explained, but it is pretty obvious that these projects require a great deal of skill and an eye for proportion. Some of the projects include a hand, a face, orchids, birds necklaces, etc. The last several chapters are on finishes and restoration of wrought iron. Another great bedside reader. The projects are perhaps a little too complicated for our fall conference contest. Color, 245 pages.



Students will construct a hacksaw based on seventeenth century examples. This style has a rack at the end opposite the handle, in which a carriage, made to take the blade laid vertically or horizontally, is moved by a screw to supply tension. The rack will be stabilized by a scroll or acanthus leaf. Parts will be forged, filed and chased. Some parts will be brazed in the forge. Decorative techniques demonstrated will include piercing, chasing in solid material, and filing. Participants may prepare wooden handles prior to the class or make them

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to fit later. Intermediate skill level- involves complex forging. Students may contact Tom Latane' with any questions about the project: tclatane@gmail.com


