
The Guild of Metalsmiths Sharing Library

Check out these additions to TGoM's library. Thanks to Librarian Richard Zielike for the reviews. These are available for checkout. Watch for more down the road.

From Forge and Anvil, by Candace Leslie. It's mostly pictures about the decorative artwork that Erich Reisel made in Texas. As a young guy, he made a (looks like about a 6' X 6' X 4' (based on the picture of the people standing by it)) portable feather-cleaning machine for redoing feather beds in Germany. They would take the various villages to clean beds. After he finished his apprenticeship, he was admitted into the German Naval Academy, but his father refused to sign a letter of permission, and so he immigrated to America because there was no work in Germany. Black and White. 86 pages, with page 30 and after of his artwork. Pretty amazing stuff, and easy reading.

Gas Burners for Forges, Furnaces and Kilns, by Michael Porter. We have a copy of this book, but it is one of our more popular ones, and it's usually checked out. Michael starts out by explaining the different functions of burner parts, and then starts by explaining how to build a ¹/₂" burner. That part is pretty straightforward. It really helps to understand this section, because he refers back to it (a lot) when doing a ³/₄", a 1", and a 1 ¹/₄" burner. It's almost like reading an insurance policy. You will find yourself flipping pages because a lot on instructions are like "follow the directions in Chapter 7, Step 5". Porter also tells how to build 4 different types of forges, a cart, and tips on brazing. Black and White, 204 pages.

Engraving Metals, by Paul Hasluck. This is a Lindsay Publication reprint of a great old (1912) classic. It has chapters on tools, practice exercises, engraving precious metals, monograms, and nameplates. There is even a chapter on engraving coffins! There are some specialized tooling involved, but it is certainly do-able. Kind of a "getting" lost art with CNC, etc. Obviously black and white, with 159 pages.

Learn to make wheat stalks w/leaves as elements of a sculpture. Full sculpture can be completed depending on time.


Required tools: gas forge, anvil, leg vise, hand files, scrolling tongs, tongs to hold 1/8" – 3/8" round stock and 1/8" flat stock, forging hammers, small sharp cross peen hammer, grinder w/ grinder wheel, cut off wheel and sanding wheels, wire brush, brass brush, veining tool for leaves, diverging 'V' tool, needle nose pliers or vise grip 6LN, hand held torch (oxy propane or acetylene) & other favorite tools. **Optional tools** (bring if you have): touch mark NOTE: The number of required tools is pretty long and specific. Some are used extensively while others are used for a few minutes and could be shared. If there are questions on any of the tools required, please contact Jesse Gavin directly at 715-808-5891 **Safety Equipment**: cotton clothing, gloves, hearing protection, safety glasses, leather boots, gas welding goggles **Lunch**: bring your own or go to town ~4 miles away.

Forge Welding Class

Saturday & Sunday, November 17 & 18, 9 am to 5 pm each day Location: MN School of Horseshoeing (map page 7) Instructor: Dave Mariette Cost: \$160 member, \$180 non-member Maximum students: 8. Minimum: 5

Forge welding. So, you've seen it done. It looked so easy. Why doesn't it work for me, you ask? David will seek to dispel the mythical mysticism that seems to surround this technique, and give you the tools you need to begin forge welding. Like many things there is no magic bullet. It is a compilation of doing everything right, not just one thing.

Starting from the ground up learning to manage heat, you'll begin with some basic welding, and as you gain some experience move on to a few more advanced welding configurations. Some solid basic forging experience would be beneficial.

Safety Equipment: The usual. Eye and ear protection. No flammable clothing. Leather work boots. Since we are forge welding and there will be more sparks than usual, students should dress with that in mind. Bring an apron if you have one.

Tools and Equipment: As part of the cost of the class, students will be provided with their own wire brush and a 1-lb. can of EZ Weld. **Lunch arrangements:** Bring a bag lunch or visit one of the area restaurants.

Handled Struck Tools Workshop

Saturday, Dec. 1, 8 am to 5 pm Location: MN School of Horseshoeing (map page 7) Instructors: Jesse (lead instructor) and Dave Gavin, others Cost: \$85 Minimum six students Maximum eight.

The tools made will be punches with a wire handle and chisels with a wire handle.

We will offer the option to use treadle hammers supplied by the teaching staff. (Find out if you really need one of these by trying them.) Last year we used 3 different

treadle hammers for the eight students. Tools for the treadle hammers will be supplied. Steel used will be 5/8 and 3/4 inch round 4140 AN for the punches and chisels. Handles will be fabricated from ¹/₄ and or 5/16 round CRS.

The goal of the workshop is to produce students comfortable with the process of forging and heat treating tools from tool steel. The secondary goal is to have the students comfortable with the use of treadle hammers. We forge in the morning, heat treat and install handles after lunch.

We've accepted that most of the time is spent focusing on understanding the heat treat process. There will be enough stock so we can encourage you to make a couple of serious mistakes and still go home with real tools to use or to offer for the next "iron in the hat".

Power grinders are supplied. Bring your favorite hammers and tongs suitable for the stock if you have them. Bring your basic safety gear (leather, cotton, gloves, eye and ear protection and safety shoes). This class has been going annually for quite a while and has always filled. Credit for that goes to Jesse and Dave.




