# My Bio: Martin Pansch

I had worked on various metal projects before, but I got my start in blacksmithing in 1997 when working seasonally at Historic Fort Snelling. Tom Sanders, the Fort blacksmith at the time, got to choose two shop apprentices from the ranks of historic interpreters that year, and I was one of the lucky two. By the time I finished my first nail, I was hooked. By the end of the season Tom had helped me forge my

first hammer (I just struck, he did the rest) and helped me find a good rivet forge and leg vise. My first contact with The Guild was when Tom hosted a Guild meeting at the Fort. He demonstrated forging a claw hammer into a bowl adze, with me and the other apprentice striking. When I asked Tom afterward if he thought I should join the Guild, with his penchant for understatement and of letting me make my own decisions, he allowed only, "They are not a bad group." I joined in early 1999. Well, I sort of joined. I paid dues. I didn't get too involved, instead plugging away at my forge when I could, learning a little but not too much. I got mobilized a few times and spent 2005 in Afghanistan doing some things. When I came back some things had changed in my life and my Guild membership had expired. As self-medication I joined the Guild again, but this time for real. Rich Herman, Guild president at the time, pointed me to the education committee. There I met Jim Moenck, Gordon Barr and other Guild pillars who taught me a lot, both in committee and in the shop. I championed some classes. Then I helped teach classes. Then I taught some as the lead. I started taking a lot of classes, both through The Guild and at Tunnel Mill, and having shop play-dates with other Guild members. With all this contact, my learning curve went from a gently rising slope to something closer to the trajectory of a Saturn V. Twenty+ years later I am still gobbling up whatever skills I can get.

### Q: How long have you been blacksmithing? Teaching?

Blacksmithing, about 21 years. Teaching, as in hands-on blacksmithing skills, maybe 10 years. I have been doing demonstrations for the public since I first started, which is teaching as well, just more theory than practice.

#### Q: What drives you to teach?

The karmatic "red ink" on my account from everyone who helped me. That and because teaching forces me to make sure I know what the heck I am doing before the class.

#### Q: What is the most common misconception that novice smiths have about the craft?

Besides starting with too big of a "bigger" hammer? I would say thinking that the tools make the smith. You don't need a lot more than know how and motivation to get started.

### Q: Any tips for a new blacksmith?

If you want to do it, get after it. Read the books. Watch the demos. Take classes. Try the skills, even ones that you don't necessarily think align with your interests. Ask questions—multiple times, to multiple people. Practice the things you want to get good at many, many times. Look at a lot of other people's metalwork, figure out how they made it, and what is good or bad about it.

#### Q: What is the most important quality of a successful blacksmith?

I would say patience, persistence, the ability to look objectively at the good and bad of your work, and a desire to always chase improvement.

### Q: What is your favorite thing to make? Most challenging project (tried or accomplished)?

I love making tools and functional items with multiple parts, anything that has a definite function, so in the end you can know whether you succeeded or not. For me the most challenging thing is making things look good. The rules of design aesthetics I still fight with.

### Q: Who did you learn from? Is there a memorable lesson or anecdote you'd like to share?

Formally I've learned from Tom Sanders, Tom Latané, Peter Ross, Bill Fiorini, Kirsten Skiles, Mike Blue, Nathan Robertson, Dave and Jesse Gavin, Darryl Ponder, Marty Hicks, Mark Pierce, Shel Browder (I know I am missing some). Informally, Jim Moenck, Jim Ericksen, Gordon Brown, John Adams, Mike Fasold, and just about any metalworker I have played in the shop with, got to watch demonstrate, read their books/articles/posts, or picked the brains of.

An anecdote or lesson to share... hmm.... Tom Sanders started me on nail making on my first morning in the forge. He showed me how to make one, told me to make 25 good nails and left me to it. That afternoon he came back into the shop, looked at the gnarly set of golf club-looking wanna-be nails I had made and again demonstrated how to forge one. The first time I knew so little I didn't even know what to be watching for. The second time I had at least enough of the shared "language" of the craft to get more out of watching him. In the years since I have seen him, or anyone else forge a nail, I learn something different.

#### Q: If I wasn't smithing, I would be...

...pursuing some other craft that requires hand skills and a calibrated eyeball, probably some form of woodworking. I have dabbled in hewing and timber framing. Making bows and crossbows is on my to-do list, along with a lot of period skills. They have taken back seat to metalwork, smithing, and a host of associated skills, at least for now.



This is a one-day class to practice basic blacksmith skills and introduce tenon joinery. The project will be to forge 3 identical pieces, including slotting & drifting holes, and forging & sizing tenons to complete a basic

trivet. This class is good for nearly all skill levels. The simple design of this trivet allows for achievable joinery with moderate blacksmithing skills and the tools provided in the class. Additional forging opportunities will be coming up (the Nowthen Hammer-In and various demonstrations), which opens this class to those who have basic beginner experience but might not be able to complete the piece in one day. The design can easily be adapted to challenge the experienced/advanced smith, too (with the addition of claw feet, for example) – bring your sketches and ideas! Special note: the project for the 2019 Fall Conference will be a trivet!



Favorite hammer and tongs for forging ½" square bar. Punches, drifts, and tenon-shaping tools will be available for use during the class. Stock will be provided.

# Hammer Class: Making a blacksmith hammer



### Small Coal Forge Build



Kitty Latane' will be teaching 3 days of tin smithing, including Tin Smithing a Pierced Tin Lantern. Sign up for one or more days.






