
June Guild meeting set for Wednesday, June 12 at Mike Alm's shop

Bring your own tools if you have them. Some limited steel stock is available, but if you need specific sizes feel free to bring your own steel, scrap pieces ok.



Motion to approve minutes by Derrick, seconded by Mark, motion

TREASURER'S REPORT-Taya-new TGoM credit card works well and most bills are being paid electronically. The NEON account has been moved to savings. Discussed where to put "employer matching funds", but no action was taken. At the end of April the balances

Savings Balance: \$58,678.85 (includes Grant Fund; \$6,240.43) MEMBERSHIP-Gordon-338 members are current; we have 26 new members and 113 renewals. Most people are paying with credit

EDUCATION-Christina-The class calendar is complete. We also discussed the Blacksmith Merit Badges, as about 6 Scouts a month were completing their badge at the Jackson Street Roundhouse before the sprinkler burst.

PROGRAM-Derrick-The June program is at Mike Alm's, August is at Dan Pate's and we are looking at a potential meeting place in October. Our Christmas party will be at the CSPS hall December 8th. Fall Conference-Valerie Ostenak's contract is in and we are waiting for Jeremy Knipple's contract. Valerie will be doing the preconference class.

PUBLICATION-Peter-The Forum is working well and summer demonstrators are being added. March issue of "Metalsmith" is 95% complete and going to the printers next week. Kim Maas is the champion for the June issue.

OLD BUSINESS-the remaining old chairs will be given away at the June meeting and it was agreed to sell the old trailer to Joe Gavin for \$1,500 (which was the most we could get for it in a trade).

The roundhouse blacksmith shop was discussed again. There might be a possibility of using a different bay, but everything at this stage is tentative.

NEW BUSINESS-Our website was discussed. The platform it's based on has become quite unstable and the content is not "mobile friendly". A two-phase approach was recommended with the estimated cost of \$3,500, with \$2,200 devoted to updating the platform and the other \$1,300 to "update back end stuff". Motion to start the process by Marty, seconded by Mark, motion passes. Planning committee to consist of Mark, Marty and Peter, and Georgia Myers and Craig Snyder.

Finney Company-the publishers of our "Iron Menagerie" has been sold to Rowman & Littlefield. We will need to see if the new owner is willing to continue publishing our book. They will probably not be represented at the fall conference.

TGoM cards-Kim Maas is getting permission slips to publish pictures of our projects and to make greeting cards with them.

Knife Tongs Class

When: August 24, 2019, 9am-5pm

Where: MN School of Horseshoeing (map page 7)

Cost: \$120

Instructor: Paul Widenhoefer and whomever I can pester into helping out

Class size: 8 max-6 min. Parent child combos encouraged

Description: Do you like knives and fire? Sorry, dumb question. Have you thought about making knives but don't feel that you have the tools to start? Well this is the class for you! This class is designed for the person new to blacksmithing or knifemaking looking for a variety of tongs for the different aspects of knifemaking, but is money-conscious (buying new tongs is expensive!). You can expect to leave the class with up to 5 working tongs. We will be starting with tongs blanks from Ken's Custom Iron. They

have allowed me to bundle a set of tongs that is geared for the knifemaker, but could be used by any new blacksmith. We will tailor the tongs for the different aspects of knifemaking.

Tools needed: Favorite hammer, files, wire brush, safety gear (cotton clothes, eye/ ear protection, boots, gloves)

Class description:

Whether you are looking for an addition to your period demonstration kit or just want to add some class to your 5-gallon bucket the Lancashire style hacksaw is just the dapper tool you have been looking for. In this class we will be making a 6-inch version of this classic style hacksaw (see photo) using mostly traditional techniques. We will be forging the frame, drilling then drifting the hole square, forging and cutting threads in a tensioning bolt and wing nut, and filling the whole lot to a nice finish. Finally we will be burning a tang into a

wooden handle and peening the tang. We will be working with relatively small stock (1/ 4" thick) so one doesn't have to be terribly strong but being able to forge to dimension and accurately split stock with a slitter or hot cut is necessary. We may use striking and top tools to facilitate some steps but it is not required. Students who successfully complete this class should have no problem scaling the process up to make a larger saw on their own if they wish. This is a class for intermediate to advance students.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the class:

Forging hammer, tongs for 1/4" and 3/16" flat, 3/8" and 1/2" square, 1/2" round, hacksaw (ironic, I know), slitter/hot cut, ¼" or 3/8" spring fuller or top and bottom fullers, ¼" square drift, 1/4" tap and die (match threads preferably), set hammer, sledge hammer, a flatter, a scrap of leather to keep from marring the near finished saw while in the vise, hot rasp, and a good selection of files (flat, half round, round bastards).

Safety Equipment: Safety glasses, ear plugs, work gloves.

Special Instructions: Limited accommodations available at the Pansch farm.

Camping on site also available.




During this two-day class, guest instructor Valerie Ostenak will share the finesse of using hammer and anvil to cold-forge a sculptural neckpiece, bracelet, and earrings from non-ferrous metal. Copper wire of different gauges will be provided. Students may opt to bring silver.

As no forge work is needed and lighter hammers will be used, a wide range of skill levels can be accommodated, though basic beginner blacksmith skills are suggested as a pre-requisite for this class. Ms Ostenak's project design can challenge intermediate and accomplished smiths as well.

Students should bring hammer and anvil. Borrowing an anvil might be a possibility; ask while registering. Dressing the hammer to a mirror-polish is one of the class activities. A few smaller tools will be detailed in an acceptance letter. There will be a buffing machine for shared use, and a belt grinder.

Set-up Wednesday evening or Thursday morning. Camping is available on-site. Equipment will need to be moved out Friday directly after class to make room for the Fall Conference weekend's events. Plan to stay for the Friday evening conference kick-off: slide presentation by Valerie Ostenak, potluck dinner, and The Guild of Metalsmiths' gallery opening!


Safety glasses are mandatory, as is proper clothing and protection for cold hammering, machine buffing and grinding. (Natural fiber clothing & footwear. Sleeves, shirttails, and long hair should all be kept constrained so as not to catch in machinery.)

June 7, 8 & 9 Steel trivet or side table with Jennifer Horn



Jennifer Horn is a Certified Journeyman Farrier and artistic Blacksmith who has been serving the northern Michigan horse owner community since 1990. Jennifer will teach us how to build an end table with round pass throughs, warps, square corners, forge welds, and other traditional metalworking techniques.



August 17, 18, 19, Make Damascus (layered steel) with Ric Furrer-Door County Blacksmith



As in years past we will weld a stack of layered steel, forge it into a bar, shape that bar into a knife. From there you will grind, heat treat, and etch that knife prior to attaching a handle.

You can explore more complicated patterning techniques if you wish, but the more time you spend on the blade the less time you have to complete the knife.

October 11, 12 & 13 Decorated hammer heads with Tom Latane'



Students will forge a hammer head and then chase the cold steel to ornament the form. Acanthus leaf, greenman face, and rope border motifs will be demonstrated. Skill level- Intermediate to advanced. There will be some demonstration of tool forging, heat treating, and grinding, but to get the most work accomplished, students should prepare some tool blanks (to be ground as needed) or finished tooling before the class. Specifications will be sent to registering students.




