Meet the Instructor... Jim Ericksen



I have been a TIG welder for 25 years, and a hobbyist blacksmith for over 10. My metal interests include art and music. My interest in metal art began in 1999, working for a welding shop owner who encouraged artistic creativity. This employer allowed his welders free time on Fridays to create projects from scrap metal. I began blacksmithing when my daughter was a few months old and now she joins me in the shop on occasion.

Q: How long have you been blacksmithing? Teaching?

I've been blacksmithing somewhere around a baker's dozen (in years - not muffins). I have taught a few classes for the past four years.

Q: What drives you to teach?

I enjoy seeing the creativity of others and learning from smiths (regardless of skill level).

Q: What is the most common misconception that novice smiths have about the craft?

The most common misconception is thinking one needs a full arsenal of tools to try the craft. You don't need a fancy anvil, forge, and hand tools to start learning the creative process.

Q: Any tips for a new blacksmith?

Take safety seriously, you have one set of eyes and hearing cannot be regained. If you're lucky enough to be invited to someone's shop - ask what you can do to help, leave the shop in better shape than you arrived.

Q: What is the most important quality of a successful blacksmith?

Patience, persistence, and a thirst for knowledge.

Q: What is your favorite thing to make? Most challenging project (tried or accomplished)?

Bottle openers are my default answer. My only rule for the opener is to make it functional, the design is the fun part. My most challenging project (that I'm still working on) is a vise from the Tunnel Mill class.

Q: Who did you learn from? Is there a memorable lesson or anecdote you'd like to share?

Wyatt Bienfang set the hook, and I've learned from countless others throughout the years. Nathan Robertson taught me how to make a hammer. Jim Moenck taught me how to make a knife. Martin Pansch taught me how to enjoy the technical aspects of the craft.

If I wasn't 'smithing, I would be birding, or biking.

HAMMER CLASS: Making a Blacksmith Hammer

Saturday, May 2, 2020, 9 am to 4:30 pm

Location: Minnesota School of Horseshoeing (map page 7)

Cost: \$50

Instructors: Jim Moenck and crew

Class size: Maximum students: 8, Minimum: 6

This class will teach you the skills you need to make a hammer. With this knowledge you will then be able to expand your tool chest with other handled tools. All handled tools such as top fullers, punches and flatters start with this same process. We will begin with a piece of steel, punch the eye, shape both striking ends, heat treat and put the handle on. You will go home with your own hammer. There will be an assortment of weights to choose from so that you can make a hammer that fits you and your needs.

Required Tools: Your favorite hammers: one for striking hot metal, one for striking punches and drifts, and a sledge for striking if you have one. All other tools will be furnished. Safety Equipment – The normal safety equipment is required. Lunch Arrangements: Bring your own bag lunch or eat out at one of the local establishments.



Upcoming Classes at Raspberry Island Folk School

Beginning Blacksmithing

Saturday, May 16, 202 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Instructor: Gary Hill

A beginning class in the principles of blacksmithing using a coal fired forge. No previous forging experience required. This one-day class includes starting and maintaining a coal fire in the forge, tapering, upsetting, hot cutting, fullering, swaging and forge welding techniques. Projects will apply these principles.



Course fee: \$40 (includes all materials). High School students 14 years and older are FREE! Limited to 4 students

Beginner's Class in Forging Pattern Welded Steel ("Damascus")

Saturday-Sunday May 30-31 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (evening participation optional) Instructor: Jeff Harper

This two-day introductory class will take you through the basics of pattern welded/Damascus steel to make either a blade or small tool. Using high carbon steel, we will focus on material preparation and will forge-weld a small billet by hand. Subsequent larger billets will be done with the help of the power hammer. Pattern manipulations will progress as student proficiency allows. We will go into forge welding billets of steel cable and chain. Day two will consist of shaping, polishing, heat treatment, and etching. Students will go home with a couple of billets of their own creation, as well as the knowledge to make more.

Course Fee: \$150 plus materials fee \$35-40 Limit 8 students. No forging experience required. See www.raspberryislandfolkschool.blogspot.com for registration and more details.

Competitions at the 2020 ABANA Conference June 3-6 in Saratoga, NY: something for every smith!

Chain-Making competitions to be held Wednesday evening at the conference.

Novice division:

You will have 20 minutes to make the best three links of chain that you can. Each link must be forge

welded shut to produce a short length of chain. You will be given three 6-inch long pieces of 3/8-inch round bar from which to form the links. There will be a bucket with more stock available if you have an issue with a link. ABANA will provide all the tooling you will require: a hammer, 3/8-inch V-bit tongs (courtesy of Blacksmith's depot), flux and a flux spoon. No finish (wax or other) is allowed on the completed links Never competed before? We've got your back! Wednesday afternoon will be open to all in the education tent. Jennifer Petrila (competition Judge) and the education team, will be giving demonstrations and providing hands-on instruction aimed at the novice level of smith.

Intermediate division:

You will have 30 minutes to make two links of chain and a repair link. The chain links must be forge welded shut. The repair link is forged from a length of 3/8-inch square bar. You will be given two 6-inch long pieces of 3/8-inch round bar from which to form the links, together with a short length of 3/8-inch square bar. There will be a bucket with more stock available if you have an issue with a link. You are required to provide your own tooling, hammer, tongs, punch, drift and flux spoon. Flux will be provided. No finish (wax or other) is allowed on the completed links.

Open Division:

You will have 75 minutes to make two links of chain, a split link and a bottom tool for the anvil. You will be given four, 6-inch long pieces of 3/8-inch round bar from which to form the chain links, split link and the stamp for the bottom tool, together with a 4½-inch long piece of 1½-inch square mild steel from which to make the bottom tool. You will be furnished a heading-block (courtesy of Ball and Chain Forge) and a sledge-hammer. You are required to provide your own hammer, tongs (3/8-inch and 1½) and flux spoon. Flux will be provided. I have a limited supply of 1½ tongs available if you make prior arrangements with me. No finish (wax or other) is allowed on the completed links or bottom tool.




