TGoM membership meeting goes online for Guild members...

August 12 'Zoom/YouTube' TGoM Online Meeting with Demonstration by Brendan Stevans

Meeting to begin on Zoom at 6:45 pm with the Business Meeting to start at 7:00.

This will be a totally online meeting including a live demonstration with Brendan Stevans from his home in Mayer MN. The meeting will start on Zoom with the business meeting and then the demonstration will take place on YouTube. Note that both Zoom and YouTube can be accessed from a computer, tablet or smartphone.

To join the Zoom meeting, we will be sending out an email to all current Guild members that have email addresses with a link to the meeting. If your membership is not paid up and current, this is a good time to do that to make sure you get the email. You should not have a login id and password for Zoom to attend this meeting but will have to download a small Zoom program to make it work. Normally you just have to click on the link in the email and follow the prompts.

YouTube:

The main demonstration will take place on YouTube and be a live demonstration. The demonstration will be forging a 2-lb rounding hammer with a power hammer.

We will post a link in the Zoom Chat to get to the live demonstration. For YouTube, you can watch without having a Gmail account, but if you want to comment in the YouTube Chat, you will have to have a Gmail account and be logged into YouTube. Brendan's friend Eric Kerber is helping us out with the video work and will be keeping track of any questions that come in and relaying them to Brendan. Thank you, Brendan! Thank you, Eric!

Meet the Instructor Bob Brown



Spotlighting a member of The Guild of Metalsmiths who has generously shared knowledge, talent, and time as a class instructor for TGoM.

Twin Cities native Bob Brown remembers watching his grandfather repair farm equipment using a simple forge and anvil. A mechanic by trade,

Bob spent over 30 years in the auto industry and often used his self-taught skills as a welder in his work. In 2008 he attended a Guild of metalsmith meeting as a guest and now enjoys taking and teaching classes as a member of TGoM and ABANA. More mechanical than artistic, Bob especially enjoys forging tools and fabricating machinery.

Q: How long have you been blacksmithing? Teaching?

I have been pounding and reshaping metal for over 50 years. Early experience: building a minibike frame from scratch out of water pipe. A 4-H small engine project at the age of twelve. Repairing autos and farm equipment with an oxy/acetylene torch for heat.

Traditional blacksmithing started in 2009? with the beginners' class and I was hooked. I took classes from Gordon Williams, Randy McDaniel, and Heather McLarty in Arizona. Several Classes at Tunnel Mill.

Started as an Associate Instructor at Beginners Classes the next year after completing Beginners Class myself.

Q: What drives you to teach?

I like passing on the skills I have been taught.

Q: What is the most common misconception that novice smiths have about the craft?

The number and sequence of steps it takes to create a project

Q: Any tips for a new blacksmith?

Learn the correct forging temp (color). Yes, you will burn some pieces. Don't be afraid to HIT the metal.

Q: What is the most important quality of a successful blacksmith?

Good hand-eye coordination. AND Patience.

Q: What is your favorite thing to make? Most challenging project (tried or accomplished)?

Enjoy demo'ing at threshing shows making small gift type demo items. Bottle openers, steak turners, cross pendants and leaves. Most challenging project to date is the small bench vise project by Tom Latane' (still to be completed).

Q: Who did you learn from? Is there a memorable lesson or anecdote you'd like to share?

Many thanks to my local mentors Myron Hanson, Bill the Welder, Dick Carlson, Charlie Bateman, John Adams, David Mariette. Other people include Mark Asprey, Gordon Williams, Heather McLarty, Randy McDaniel, Tom Latane'

Q: Finish this sentence: When I'm not smithing...

I am repairing, welding/fabricating, and woodworking.

1. Join the Education Committee

Help guide the direction of education offerings by the Guild for its members and the public. As a group, the Education Committee sets and monitors the class offerings each academic year. We do short- and long-term planning, policy setting, promotions, and some of us also act as class champions (coordinators).

Time commitment: Meet monthly as a group, (currently, via Zoom, pre-pandemic at the Danish American Center in South Mpls) one evening a month for about 2 hours. Year-around with a break typically July-August.

A typical discussion might be expanding on a class idea that has been brought to us by the champion or potential instructor, working out the logistics to make it a good fit within our class offerings, which range from beginner- to advanced-level and cover a variety of topics within the metalworking field. Several classes repeat yearly. The beginner blacksmith sessions are a staple as well as tool-making. We might then talk about the maintenance of Guild-owned tools, what trends and interest we see in new classes, and how we can meet the demand while balancing our all-volunteer resources.

Skills needed: none specific. While many of our group have skills that are used when wearing their "other hat" (as an instructor, for example, or engineering and fabricating the latest forge design), as a committee member you just need to have the interest in furthering education. If you like to make things happen, work with a variety of people, and help promote the classes and purpose of our group, we'd love to have you join us!


