
What is 'Zoom'?

Hello, I was raised on a working Ddiry farm in central Minnesota and proud that I paid for my first two years of schooling (cash) with proceeds from milking cows for several neighbors over many years. I have a degree as a machinist and a degree in electronics.

I don't really know the specific origins of my interest in blacksmithing other than metal working in general and my early experiences in repairing farm equipment and welding up equipment after the neighbors figured out I could weld

Q: How long have you been blacksmithing? Teaching?

I have been in Blacksmithing since 2007. I took the class along with Larry W. and several others. Teaching since 2012.

Q: What drives you to teach?

Simple, I love to learn. There is an old saying that goes something like, "If you think you know something, try teaching it". I have found it to be a great learning experience full of interesting and great people. The Guild has an amazing depth of knowledge to it. Teaching reminds me that I have much to learn.

Q: What is the most common misconception that novice smiths have about the craft?

That you can pick this craft up without putting time and effort into it.

Q: Any tips for a new blacksmith?

If you don't know something, then ask, and more than likely you will receive the answer in short order. Get involved with the Guild. Join a committee, become a teacher, demo at summer events, ask questions and seek out information. Practice, practice and practice. This craft is full of amazingly skilled people willing to share.

Q: What is the most important quality of a successful blacksmith?

Asking questions and *actively* listen to the answers. Oh, and hit the metal!

Q: What is your favorite thing to make? Most challenging project (tried or accomplished)?

Making tools such as a tire hammer, treadle hammer, gas forge, and tooling for each.

My favorite project:

Wall sconce incorporating traditional techniques.

Q: Who did you learn from? Is there a memorable lesson or anecdote you'd like to share?

I would have a hard time picking any one person. I have spent time with most individuals in the Guild and have learned a great deal from each. I also think I learned a lot from watching demos and summer demonstration events. Also, a week with Mark Aspery would top the list. When I watch a demo, I try to watch with an open mind and to understand the why and how someone is doing their demonstration, and just maybe, I can learn something. I always do.

Q: Finish this sentence: If I wasn't smithing, I would be...

Traveling, building tools, building shop, playing with my new 3D printer, snowmobiling with my son, gardening, and learning new things (Oh, and time with my wife!) Life is too short....... Blessings.

Beginners Blacksmithing Classes Fall 2020

Registration is now open for the three day Beginners Blacksmithing classes October 17, 24, 31 at The Minnesota School of Horseshoeing - map below

The beginners basic classes are designed to give everyone the same understanding of the basics, techniques and terminology. The basic classes or proficiency is required before taking any of the many other classes the Guild offers. This enables those classes to concentrate on advanced techniques without having to spend time on basic concepts.

This 3 day class covers the basics of: Safety, Tools, Fire Control, Forging Dynamics, Tapers (ribbon, fishtail, point), Twisting, Riveting, Shouldering, Upset, Cutting, Splitting, Punching, Heat Treat, Scrolling, Bending, Forge weld.

Cost: (covers everything you need, the facility, coal, metal tools and workbook)

\$180 for members, \$190 non members

Minors (under 18) must have a parent present. There will be no sharing of forges.

Dates and Location:

The classes are held on Saturdays at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing, 6250 Riverdale Dr NW, Ramsey MN 55303, just off Hwy 10 near the Anoka Vocational College. (Map below)

What you need to bring:

Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs and suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal. A mask (non-synthetic) is also required for classroom demonstrations.

Tools:


Tools are provided, but if you have a favorite hammer, punches, chisels and tools, bring them along. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable.

Typical day:

Classes start at 9 am, but people usually show up earlier to swap stories or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on to show. We break for lunch. You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant. Classes end between 3 and 5


