Meet the Instructor Paul Widenhoefer



Paul Widenhoefer

Spotlighting a member of The Guild of Metalsmiths who has generously shared knowledge, talent, and time as a class instructor for TGoM.

...sharing our passion for metalworking!



I've been interested in knives and weapons since childhood, not realizing that I could actually make "real" ones at that time. Everything I had made, up to that point, was made from mild steel. I went on to get an art degree and did much metal casting. It wasn't until after joining the Guild that my interest in knifemaking and metallurgy took off. Since then I've taken every knife making class I could, whether it was through the Guild or elsewhere.

This has included taking classes through the ABS, American Bladesmith Society, in Arkansas and attending some of their knifemaking symposiums and this has had a huge impact on me and what I look for in my knives.

Q: How long have you been blacksmithing? Teaching?

I have been blacksmithing since 2004 and taught my first class in 2012.

Q: What drives you to teach?

My car or van depending on how much stuff I need to move.

Q: What is the most common misconception that novice smiths have about the craft?

There are many misconceptions about making blades. Ideas I try to emphasize are using good steel, metallurgy, safety and keeping your blades straight.

O: Any tips for a new blacksmith?

Start with good steel and the best equipment that you can afford. That includes taking the best classes you can afford with instructors who can give you good feed back on how to improve your skills. You can start with little equipment, but you need to know where to best put your money. Ask around to find out what other smiths recommend. We are an opinionated bunch and will tell you what we like. Also be willing to seek out those more knowledgeable than yourself and LISTEN to their feedback, especially when they are pointing out things you can improve on with your knives. Be willing to put your blades to the test and make sure they function well and hold up in real world scenarios.

O: What is the most important quality of a successful blacksmith?

Two important qualities are patience and tenacity—the willingness to fail and fail again, then learn from those failures.

Q: What is your favorite thing to make? Most challenging project (tried or accomplished)?

Right now, I have been diving into the wide world of making Damascus. There is so much to learn and so many possibilities.

Q: Who did you learn from? Is there a memorable lesson or anecdote you'd like to share?

I have had many, many instructors. One great experience was when I brought a knife to the Northern Metalsmiths' conference in Itasca and Ed Caffery, an ABS Mastersmith, was demonstrating. I showed him the knife I made and asked for feedback on how to improve. He was very generous and kind, but also very blunt. He gave me a long list of things I could improve on my knife. After talking, I quickly ran to my car and wrote down several pages of notes on what he had told me.

Q: Finish this sentence: If I wasn't smithing, I would be...metal casting and doing other arty things.

Minutes-Motion to approve the minutes by Jesse, seconded by Gordon, motion passes.

Treasurers report-Taya- Business Checking: \$14,245.10, Simple Checking: \$3,313.77, Savings: \$64,660.49. More dues have been coming in on Neon.

Membership-Gordon-without our in-person meetings, our new member numbers are down, but people are renewing.

Communication-Peter-The Forum continues to come out as scheduled. As a will edit the December **Metalsmith** issue. Our new website should be live by the new year with new wording and pictures

Education-Christina-The first beginner class began on October 10, and next January's class is full.

Program-Derrick-We had over 30 people at our Zoom fall conference. We are canceling our in-person membership meetings until June. Motion to approve by Derrick, seconded by Jesse, motion passes. We will be holding Zoom meetings through April.

Old Business-The Rich Herman memorial fund is \$550. We discussed different ways to honor Rich's legacy, and eventually came up with a decision, pending Cathy's approval.

Election of officers-we decided to hold our election of officers when we can have an in-person membership meeting. Those board members whose term is expiring are willing to serve another term.


