Barb Hanson


Barb Hanson, longtime TGoM family member and wife of Myron Hanson

Barbara Jean Hanson of Eagan, MN passed away on January 15, 2021 after a 3 and 1/2 year battle with Leukemia at the age of 74. She was born on March 24, 1946 in Red Wing, MN to Robert F. and Dorothy L. (DeRoy) Steffenhagen. She grew up on farms in the Frontenac, MN area. She attended the one-room country school in Frontenac, MN and Washington Elementary and Lincoln High School in Lake City, MN. She was the 1964 Homecoming Queen at Lincoln High School where she also graduated in June 1964.

She worked at the Royal Cafe in Lake City, MN where she met her husband, Myron C. Hanson. They were married on Sept. 23, 1964 at the St. John's Lutheran Church in Frontenac, MN. They lived in North Dakota, Florida and Wisconsin before settling in Eagan, MN. They raised two sons during their 56 years of marriage. Guild of Metalsmiths Board Meeting Via Zoom January 13, 2021

Called to order at 7:05 pm by Larry

Secretary's report-Approved

Treasurers report-Taya-Total available balance is \$77,777.38 (Business Checking \$8,620.10, Business Checking-\$4,495.07, Savings \$74,662.12). Balances show a \$1,400 decrease in assets from 2019, due to our free Zoom Fall Conference. One conference demonstrator is paid, and the other one hasn't submitted a bill. Our books balance. The coal is paid for-price remains \$7.00 a pail.

Program-Derrick-February meeting is Pete Stanaitis with a 40-minute shop tour. Announcements for the program will go out in several days. The April program is open at this time.

Education-Christina-Met Thursday, January 7. Preparing the 2021-22 calendar. Have enough instructors for the classes. The March beginning blacksmith class is full.

Membership-Gordon-Current membership is increasing and we are at 246 paid members. Discussed forgoing dues for a year, but we opted to continue with dues since we are still producing programs.

Communications-Peter- There was no November *Forum*, and December's was rather limited. The December *Metalsmith* is with Peter now, and Asa was the editor. Peter will edit the March issue. There was a lot of discussion of hosting more past issues of *Metalsmith* on the Internet and Internet security. We felt more information was necessary before coming to a decision. Peter will follow up. The new website is coming along, and we are looking for a more robust hosting service. Peter is planning on stepping down from the board at the end of this term, and will concentrate on editing *Metalsmith*.

Old Business-The Rich Herman memorials were discussed. At this time, members have contributed \$545 in honor of Rich. The board asked the Education Committee for a proposal. The Education Committee recommended the money be used to provide free classes to youth between the ages of 12-16 in a format similar to the Boy Scout Blacksmithing Merit Badge curriculum (using a coal forge, making a taper and a twist, sheet metal forming, work hardening, riveting and soldering). The take home project would be an ash shovel. Depending on the venue, there would be enough money for 12-36 students.

An outdoor June meeting was discussed with 2 different venue options. There wasn't enough consensus to make a decision.

Volunteer Coordinator-Kim-Minnesota Glove in West St Paul offers a 10% discount to Guild members. Membership cards will be printed on the back cover of *Metalsmith* for proof of membership. Kim sent postcards to expired members. We had request to use Guild cards for personal use.

New Business-We will prepare for our budget meeting in March.

Last Call for the Tire Hammer Build!!! We start buying supplies and building mid-February!!!

Tire Power Hammer Build with Allan Kress (Clay Spencer's tire hammer understudy)

Date and Time: Final build weekend will be 1-2 May 2021. Several pre-build weekends for preparing parts will be scheduled as well. Note: Final build weekend may end up being postponed depending on how COVID19 restrictions are treating us by then.

A few folks had to drop out of the tire hammer build for various reasons so we have 2 or 3 spots we can fill at this time. Call/email Martin if you are want details.

The Guild built Tire Hammers with Clay Spencer in 2007 and since then many have eagerly anticipated it happening again. If you are looking for a simple and effective entrance into the world of mechanical power hammers this is it. This is a build versus a class. That means we are all working towards the goal of producing our hammers most effectively. Do not expect to learn how to do every step of making one. I expect most of us will learn a thing or two in the process. I learned a bunch at the last one and got to know a lot of my Guild friends there.

This ad is small and the project is big. I can't cover all the details here. If you have questions call (leave a message if I don't answer and I will get back to you), text or email me. If you are interested in helping but not signing up to build a hammer for yourself let me know that as well. We had a lot of great help last time from folks who didn't go home with a hammer.

Cost: \$2100.00 in three installments. The first check for \$1000 will secure your place in the build. Timing of the other checks will be discussed in meetings. We plan on scavenging as many parts and materials as we can for this build. Any unused funds will be refunded to participants after the final bills are paid on a pro-rated based on how much they participated in the build i.e. if you don't show up to any of the pre-build workshops or assist in other meaningful ways and only show up to the final build weekend you should expect no refund. If costs run over for some reason we will address that with the group at that time. Make checks payable to "The Guild of Metalsmiths."

Class size: Maximum students: 15 Minimum students: 10

Review of New Book in TGoM's Library

Artisan Ideas has just published a book titled: FORGED: Making a Knife with Traditional Black-smith Skills by Paul White. The Guild of Metalsmiths now has this book in our library, and it will soon be available to check out.

This book will teach you to hand-build a knife using the traditional method of blacksmiths of old — FORGING.

Traditional forging of a knife blade is a process which uses the ancient techniques of moving hot steel with hammer and anvil alone into a knife-form that is ready for filing, heat treating and sharpening, with no or very minimal electric grinding.

This book also teaches traditional fit-and-finish skills using only hand tools. It explains an ancient riveted full-tang handle construction system that surpasses modern methods.


We think the book does an excellent job explaining the process of forging a knife but also in instilling enthusiasm for doing this the traditional way.




