# April 14: Join Jesse Gavin as he leads us on a virtual tour of a lemonade plant in Valencia, California

Join us on Wednesday, April 14 as Jesse Gavin takes us on a virtual "zoom" tour of the lemonade plant shown in the photo at left. Instructions on how to join this tour are below.

During this tour, Jesse Gavin will do videos of most of the areas and discuss them in production mode and installation.

He'll start at unloading, going through in order storage, unbinning, cleaning, oil removal, culling, size separation, juicing, pulp and juice separation, liquid storage, pulp and juice blending, packaging, pasteurizing, boxing, palletizing, and storage.

He'll also cover the side streams of oil processing, peel handling, and cleaning.

#### Jesse explains details of the tour:

Where is this plant (city and state), and what is its name?

Bay Center Foods is located in Valencia CA.

What is their major function? Is there more that our zoomers could benefit from if they join our zoom?

They make lemon juice with pulp to a specific ratio for a specific customer.

I am part of a team of vendors that installed and trained the plant operators how to run the plant efficiently. My company, GEA (local in Hudson WI), did the valves, pumps and designed the piping systems that transfer the different product streams - juice, pulp, oil, and peel. We also designed and implemented the clean-in-place system for the entire plant.

#### How old is it?

I started on the project in December 2018. Aat that time they only had a shell of a building. They have been commercially making product since September of 2020.

Blacksmithing is the parent of all engineering, so we are featuring this tour as an update to what is going on in industry with processing equipment.

After many meetings and conversations, it was decided that Craig Snyder, who had recently become The Guild's webmaster, would make the necessary changes to the website.

And you will notice some substantial changes! The Web Forum is no longer a feature of our site. There was a time that our message board was considered an important resource, but activity had dwindled to almost zero. Other means of communication have superseded it, such as The Bellows email list, **THE FORUM**, and **METALSMITH** magazine. Additionally, there was a cost in money and time to supporting a secure message board that could better be spent elsewhere. Craig and I retain access to the message board archives and will look at sharing some of that information via other channels.

We added a page about Member Awards, including a history of the Juaire-Hubler Award recently written by Dave Mariette. Thanks to Pete Stanaitis for recommending this addition. The page includes a link to Pete's video of Ollie Juaire.

You will also notice that the **METALSMITH** magazine archives are not currently accessible. We are working on that!

Since we have the new website, now is the opportunity to get more of our material online whether it is more member work, articles, or whatnot.





#### CHASED BOSS ON FERRULE and DECORATIVE JEWELER'S OR FRET SAW FRAME

#### Tom Latane'

June 5-7, 2021 and June 8-12, 2021

These two related classes will run consecutively. Though priority will be given to those signing up for both classes, either class could be taken singly.

#### CHASED BOSS ON FERRULE Length: 3 DAYS

Suitable for the handle of a tool or knife, this piece will be used on the saw frame by students taking both classes. Students will forge. heat treat and grind tools which they will then use to chase a stylized acanthus design on a bulbous section forged and filed on the end of a 3/4" bar. The boss will be drilled and chiseled to receive a tool tang before being cut from the bar. A ferrule will be fire brazed to the boss to complete the project.

#### DECORATIVE JEWELER'S OR FRET SAW FRAME Length: 4 Days

Designed to incorporate the boss described in the first class description, this frame can be fitted with a simpler ferrule by anyone not taking the other class. The frame will include a wider section at the top suitable for decorative profiling and piercing. The end opposite the handle will be fashioned with a square mortise to receive a threaded section with a wingnut for tensioning the blade. Both ends will have thumb screws for clamping blades.

Returning PBS Nova celebrity for his expertise with the Viking swords and his knowledge and experience in Damascus, heat treating, and pattern welded steel. Come to Tunnel mill for a three day class with Ric Furrer and leave with a knife complete with handle, and more than likely additional billets to work on at home. Check back for more information.


# Goings on...a listing of TGoM events at a glance
