We invite all the members to bring items for show and tell. Please remember items that you have shown in the past may not have been seen by some of the newer members.



2022 TGoM Annual Meeting

Good attendance at the December TGoM annual meeting resulted in a vote by ballot to change the bylaws, seen below. It also resulted in some changes to the 2023 officers and board members, also seen below. Committee heads will be determined at the January board meeting.

President Larry Wasmund stressed that most members of the board and committees have been in place for over 3 years, and that although they will remain into 2023, they will be stepping down and replacements will be asked to step up at the next annual meeting.

Christina Dodge has stepped down for 2023, and the membership heartily thanked her for her service. Meetings have been attended online via "Zoom." This will continue, according to Larry.

Proposed change to TGoM bylaws was voted on and adopted by the membership

Below is a proposed change in the Meeting section of TGoM's bylaws. The TGoM board is proposing to remove the words "THE SECOND WEDNESDAY OF THE", in the paragraph about the membership meetings.

The new language proposes this sentence to state "GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS SHALL BE HELD SIX TIMES A YEAR. MEETINGS ARE SCHEDULED FOR THE MONTHS OF FEBRUARY, APRIL, JUNE, AUGUST, OCTOBER, AND DECEMBER. THE DAY, TIME, AND PLACE OF THE MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS WILL BE POSTED IN THE 2 PREVIOUS FORUMS."




