February 17, 2024 TGoM Membership Meeting!

Listen up folks! The Guild of Metalsmiths will be having our February meeting on SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 17 @ 9;00 am at the Northfield Foundry and Machine Company, 320 Water Street N, Northfield MN. Herb Fick visited the foundry once we planned the event, and wrote this report. It has been edited where the program committee needs to make a decision about lunch and optional locations in the 3rd paragraph, otherwise the wording is from Herb.

• Disclaimer: I have known or know all of Jeff Machacek's uncles and cousins. It's why I undertook the visit.

The Foundry dates to 1920 when Mike Machacek moved to Northfield after an argument with the priest in New Prague MN. He developed a line of industrial woodworking machinery that was accepted worldwide. They closed the hot part of the operation in or about 1946, about the time I toured the factory as a boy scout. I was involved in purchase of a few large pieces of custom equipment for the Sheldahl Company in Northfield in the 1960s. Equipment that is still a source of repair work for the Foundry.

Jeff has offered a tour of the facilities on a Saturday when the shop is quiet. The equipment ranges from large lathes, boring machines, planers that handle very large castings, balancing equipment for large wheels, rollers and arbor motors which are purposely built at the foundry. Their catalog sales are based on table saws, bandsaws, drop saws, and jointers for the furniture industry. Their specials support local manufacturing industry.

The rules:

- We are in charge of our own coffee.
- If we want chairs we need to bring them.
- There is one sort of open area.
- Snacks should be in place of our usual pot luck. So bring a treat.
- Expect to stand throughout the tour.
- Expect questions to be welcome.
- Do not wear your best clothes. This is an old shop and the floors are not clean!

The foundry has a website that will be interesting to some, but it is limited. Right now their shop is booked out for about a year so don't plan on buying something to take with you. A personal note: Once you are familiar with the name, you will realize you will see their name anywhere you travel in the western world.

Beginners Blacksmithing 3-day Class March 9, 16, & 23, 2024

Dates: The classes are held on the following Saturdays of March 9, 16 and 23, 2024

Location: Minnesota School of Horseshoeing, 6250 Riverdale Dr NW, Ramsey MN 55303, just off Hwy 10 near the Anoka Vocational College (see map below).

Class Description: This 3 day class covers the basics of: Safety, Tools, Fire Control, Forging Dynamics, Tapers (ribbon, fishtail, point), Twisting, Riveting, Shouldering, Upset, Cutting, Splitting, Punching, Heat Treat, Scrolling, Bending, Forge weld. The beginners basic classes are designed to give everyone the same understanding of the basics, techniques and terminology.

The basic classes or proficiency is **REQUIRED** before taking any of the many other classes the Guild offers. This enables those classes to concentrate on advanced techniques without having to spend time on basic concepts.

Class Size: 8

Cost: \$190 for NON members, \$180 for Guild members (covers everything you need: the facility, coal, metal tools and workbook) Minors (under 18) must have a parent present. There will be no sharing of forges.

What you need to bring: Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs and suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal.

Tools: Tools are provided but if you have a favorite hammer, punches, chisels and tools, bring them along. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable.

Typical day: Classes start at 9 but people usually show up earlier to swap stories or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on to show. We break for lunch.


Lunch: You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant. Classes end between 3 and 5.

What would you like to see on this year's t-shirt?



Steel Making Workshop using the Japanese Hybrid Brick Tatara Class rescheduled from October 2023 to May 3, 4, and 5, 2024 With Wayne Potratz

- Cost per person:-\$275.00 (includes material fee)-plus \$75 for
- room and board (Friday and Saturday nights with 6 meals)
- Minimum of 6 students
- Start time: Gather at 5PM on Friday October 6 for conversation, then a light meal at 6 PM, followed by Wayne's presentation at 7 PM.
- Discussion and charcoal processing to follow.

The workshop will explore steel-making from the direct reduction of Minnesota Magnetite iron ore into high carbon steel using a charcoal fired Japanese Hybrid brick tatara. The resulting steel bloom can be consolidated, hot cut, and hammered into billets suitable for blade making.

The workshop will feature a PowerPoint presentation about the process and comparisons to other iron smelting traditions. Each workshop participant should come away with a piece of high carbon steel in an amount suitable for a small blade or other tool


