



#### News from Tunnel Mill...



Tunnel Mill is offering a High Relief Chasing class taught by Kirsten Skiles May 3, 4, and 5<sup>th</sup>, 2007.

High Relief Chasing, as Kirsten teaches it, is derived from the Japanese style of High Relief Chasing used in sword ornaments and kimono pins. The technique is

inspired by Japanese tradition

In this workshop, students will learn how to make their own high quality chasing tools and then complete a chasing that incorporates extreme elevation shifts, foldovers, undercuts and highly textured surfaces.

Students should come prepared to focus, pay attention to safety, make mistakes, tap, tap, tap a lightweight hammer until worn out, and have fun. On Thursday, we will create a set of ten chasing tools for each student. On Friday and Saturday we will move to pitch and smaller hammers to form our 5x5 inch relief images with chasing and repousse'. We will explore the use of stakes to create larger images and repoussed' forms. All of the chasing and repousse' work will be done cold with 18 bronze (CDA655) sheet.

Pitch bowls will be provided for the students to use during the workshop and will be available for purchase at the end of the workshop.


