Upcoming in 2011...

Tom Latane: Door hardware class—students will forge a spring latch with a ring handle. The forge welded ring handle will be mounted on a shaft which will pass through a chisel-cut escutcheon, (the door), and then a chisel cut latch plate and be secured to a forged cam which will lift the latch bar. The latch bar will be under pressure from a spring, forged as part of the staple which retains the bar against the latch plate. The spring provides a more positive catch than a gravity latch. Parts will be forged, filed, and fitted. May 20, 21, 22, 2011

Bernard Heer: 3-day class in early May, possible tool making, animal heads and some copper raising. Bernhard is co-author and illustrator of the book "Basic Blacksmithing." The book is a result of experiences working with rural blacksmiths in Zimbabwe and Malawi. 




Jim will offer this comfort in a one day workshop at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing on March 5.

Current Williamsburg anvil




Photo of anvil pattern

Anvil project in the works to emulate anvils used at Colonial Williamsburg

The following information was sent to the Bellows list serve on December 17 by Guild of Metalsmiths president Rich Herman. It's reproduced here in The Forum so that those who are not members of the Bellows may read all about it.

I know anyone that has been in blacksmithing for a while like me will eventually get to the point that a brand new anvil becomes a desire that is hard to resist. Instead of working with an anvil with lots of pits on the face and dinged up edges, you get a clean surface to work on. I had reached that point this year and had started to look around to try and figure out what anvil I really wanted to have.

As many of you may be aware, last summer I spent several weeks in Virginia at the BSA National Jamboree. After the Jamboree, I toured the area with some friends including a stop at Colonial Williamsburg. While there I naturally had to stop at the Blacksmith Shop, a place I have heard so much about including many of the smiths like Peter Ross and others that had worked there. At the shop I was fascinated by the anvils they used there, they were unlike anything I had seen before. They were designed with a very short tail and a short horn, and the horn was almost a perfect cone. This short tail and horn resulted in an anvil with most of the mass being in the main body of the anvil which should produce an anvil with a very large "sweet spot" to work with.

I talked with the current head blacksmith, Kenneth Schwarz about the anvils. He indicated that the anvils they used were actually reproductions of period anvils that they had cast a number of years ago. They were currently looking at getting a new batch of anvils cast to replace the ones they were using. I inquired as to whether there would be an opportunity to be included in the next batch and he indicated that they were planning on casting some extra so that would be a definite possibility.

I have since exchanged emails with him to get more information. I asked him how it was going and for more info on the anvils. Ken replied and told me that this summer he'd had a prototype anvil cast. The casting was not finished, and it has a few details that need to be altered. He is in the process of writing up a more detailed set of specifications for the new anvils and will not have a price on the competed anvil until he gets all of the specifications worked out.

He said he would be happy to have anvils made for others once they get a satisfactory prototype and have the cost set. Their initial plan is to have a dozen cast, and use about half of them there in Williamsburg, and sell the rest. If sufficient demand is shown, he will have additional castings made. Kenneth doesn't have a concrete timetable set, as he is juggling many details of construction and shop operation. However, he does anticipate having some by this time next year.

I have some photos of the pattern, which he sent to me. The prototype is around 300 pounds, It is a fifth footed anvil, although the photographs do not show the fifth foot. The face is about 6 inches wide, and 14 or 15 inches long. I am guessing that the cost for this anvil will be in in the \$1200-\$2000 range but this is yet to be determined. I believe when I talked to him last summer the plan then was to cast the anvil out of either 4140 or 4160 steel. This is probably part of the specifications to be determined.

If anyone else in the group is interested, please contact me and I will send pictures of the pattern and pictures I took in the shop last summer of their current anvils plus include you in any future communications. Having several of us together will help reduce shipping costs per anvil.
