The contestants will at this time include the Leprechaun, the chip Moenck, Dick Carlson, and at least Gary Myers, who has already offered to help Herb with the hog.


I am guessing that others will offer to put their backs into what has become a good time for Herb and Dan and Myron and Cliff and Dick and, well you get the drift.

So, have you marked your calendar yet for the Fall Madness – the Guild of Metalsmiths Fall Conference? The conference will be held this year on September 16th through the 18th at the Little Log House Power Show grounds, located six miles south of Hastings on Highway 61.

Friday afternoon is the Gallery setup; bring your best works to show off all of the great stuff you have made. This is a non-juried show; all items registered will be included in the gallery. New members are encouraged to bring things, because it is a great way to connect with the group and get free advice. If you cannot make it Friday, gallery registration is open on Saturday also.

Friday evening is the Grand Opening of The Gallery. Come early for the potluck dinner at 5 PM and join your friends to tour the wonders of the Conference gallery. We will have the demonstrators on hand, and they will talk about what they will be doing for their demonstrations.

Friday is also the opening of the tailgate area. If you need to buy or sell some equipment, the tailgate sales area is a great opportunity to exchange those hard-to-find smithin' tools. Sales are open all weekend, but the best deals usually go early. We will also have Al Kaiser the bookseller there with lots of books on blacksmithing and other crafts.

Saturday is when things really get going. Registration starts at 7:30 AM and demonstrations start at 9 AM. This year we have two wonderful demonstrators – Brian Brazeal from Brandon, MS and Tom Latané from Pepin, Wisconsin. Brian has developed meticulous hand hammer skill to master traditional blacksmithing techniques. Tom is a well-known local smith known for his meticulous style and amazing creations.

In addition to the demonstrators, other family activities for nonsmithing spouses and children include Found Art creation, Altoid Tin Repousse, Broom-making class with Mark Jackson, stacked brick bread ovens, a Scandinavian spoon carving class, and a custom leather knife sheath for your own knife with Johan Potgieter of Tandy Leather. There will be materials and instruction fees for the broom-making, spoon, oven, and sheath classes. If that isn't enough to keep you busy, browse the silent auction area to pick up that piece of steel you need or the other doodad you can't live without. And if you have an extra chunk of steel or a thingamajig you don't need, consider donating it to the silent auction.

And let's not forget the highlight of the conference, the Saturday Night Live Auction. This is a major event of the year and provides you an opportunity to pick up some wonderful items for either your shop or your living room wall. In this workshop students will pair off to form forging teams. Students will be making tools for forging. Time permitting and based on ability, students will make a hammer, hardies, hammer drift, and top tool. Students will be double striking, a learned skill in and of itself. This would be considered to be a class for the more advanced smith, but all will learn a tremendous amount regardless of their ability level.

There are openings for twenty smiths, or ten teams. This will be an intensive two days of instruction from one of the premier teachers in the country today, Brian Brazeal. He will have an assistant with him helping teach the class.

Brian Brazeal began discovering traditional blacksmithing as a farrier over 25 years ago. Brian gave up shoeing to practice traditional forging full time. Traveling the US and Europe, Brian was fortunate to have been exposed to smiths like Professor Alfred Habermann, his sons Alfred Jr., Josef and David, as well as Alfred's daughter Christine. Brian also mentored with Tom Clark, Bob Patrick, Bill Bastas, Darrell Nelson, Terry Carson, and Tsur Sadan.

Brian now continues to share and promote the techniques of this lost craft in an effort to bring traditional blacksmithing back to the world by demonstrating and sharing his practical experience and forging expertise in clinics and workshops for all skill levels. Such techniques include the forge welded bundle, tools to make tools, collaring, and "forged to finish" hammer.

Education Committee report – Chair Mariette, Vice Chair Pansch

The education class calendar is established for the year. The transition / revisions to the Beginners class has been set and the committee plans to do a "dry run". An Intermediate Class curriculum has been drafted. The class will work on and complete a grille. The plan is for the project to take 24 hours over 3 days. The proposed instructors will all be required to make the grille themselves before teaching the class. A Heavy Metal workshop is planned for the two days prior to the Madness. Brian Brazeal will teach the class. Will run if we get a minimum of six teams, maximum of 10 teams will be accepted. Preparations are still underway. Class details will follow as available.

Next Membership meeting will be held at the Minnetonka Center for the Arts. June 8th. August Membership meeting will be a corn feed. The Committee is investigating holding the October Membership meeting at the Children's Theater. The Christmas party is planned to be held at the December 11th Membership meeting.

Publicity Committee report – Chair Sigurdson, Vice Chair Rand

The new website is up and running. Will train the Committee Chairs to update the site. Craig will provide 3 months support for issues and we can contract for more content if we need / want. Henry Votel is looking to step down from handling the publishing of The Forum and Georgia Myers is willing to pick up the duties.

Unfinished Business: Discussed the questions for survey to identify why members left the Guild. Two primary questions will be investigated. First why they left the Guild (radio bullets) and an opportunity to leave a text response as a second question. Ponder will form questions and send to Board for comments with one week to comments. Ponder will report to Board at next meeting.

Guild Liability Coverage / Exposure - · Discussion of 5 general areas of exposure and the need for coverage of liability and medical.

Tools or products sold or given away Discussed issues surrounding minors and the need to have parents at class. Motion to revise liability statements regarding adults and minors at class. Board will explore the coverage necessary for the five areas above with the following general context and nature of the organization. 501C3 with 20-25 events as year, income and expenses in the range of \$31k to \$35k per year. Upcoming in 2011...

Mike Blue (Still room in this class): Damascus II, July 8, 9 and 10. Advanced patterning techniques. This class is intended to spend time in further pattern development beyond simple welding of a flat laminate and the incised patterns discussed in the previous class. Any beginners should really try to keep their projects within this domain. The complex patterns discussion will be beneficial but not an expectation.

We will discuss the development of the original mosaic designs found in European shotguns and the concepts involved in upset patterns like the current favorite "W" pattern and it's many variations including parquet development and the techiques to bring out that pattern on the surface of the billet. Another subject will be powder metal mosaic forms. This will include tool development for pattern manipulation and assistance in welding.

Anyone who wishes to explore the W pattern can bring along a lower layer count billet they prepared before the class. There will be less time talking and more time forging this go around. We're moving up into complex patterns where materials preparation will require a lot more time and the possibility of weld failures more likely.

Doug was a demonstrator at Guild of Metalsmiths Conference 2010 Doug will do two 3-day classes.

1st class—Working on lighting with electricity and mica. This is a change from the originally scheduled class on tool making. 2nd class: 3 day Drawing & Design: Drawing, design, and transforming ideas to metal.

Tom Latane' new class: October 14, 15 & 16, 2011, Norse Lock Students will construct a lock which is opened by a key that compresses a pair of springs to release the shackle. This type of lock, which can be used in many of the same applications as a padlock, has a body constructed of hammered sheet iron secured with tenoned ribs and brazed in the forge. Options for key variations will be discussed.
