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

The Education Committee decided to give the upcoming hammer-in a theme of Treadle Hammers. All members are welcome.



# **Death notice**

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The following was received from Dave Mudge, ABANA official:
The artist blacksmith with the most influence on his craft in central
Europe, Alfred Habermann, died on 28th of April in the hospital of
Waidhofen, Ybbs, in Austria only a few days before his 78th birthday.

The "pope of artist blacksmiths", the "master", as Habermann was called by almost all of his colleagues, apprentices and friends, he was a "globetrotter" of the artist blacksmith's trade. Nearly on every continent he held lessons and workshops in which he has lightened the fire of metal forging with modern patterns.

Until his last days he was working in his chosen "Heimat" Ybbsitz in Austria. During the last years he had found his place to be in the restored "Welser-Schmiede", together with his daughter Christine, who is supposed to be one of his successors in the different ways of creating. Always behind Alfred Habermann there was his wife Maria. She supported him in every single way, on every single place. With his Oeuvre Habermann created the future within the present. His visions were understood by his colleagues only years after Habermann made them come true.

He was the founder of a young, hungry generation of artist blacksmiths in Europe. Now it is up to them to show what they have learnt. This generation as sure as his master-colleagues and friends will be on the way to Ybbsitz on Friday, 2nd May, to say goodbye to one of the fixed stars of the international blacksmith's family. The funeral will start at 12 a.m.



# News from Tunnel Mill...

\*Tom Latane' will be teaching a Gothic Chest Lock Class on May 29, 30 & 31<sup>st</sup>, 2008. The class will cover the forging, filing and fitting of components of a chest lock with a spring loaded bolt to retain a hasp. A roughed



out key blank will be available to be fitted, using saw and files, to a set of wards which will be fabricated with mortise and tenon joints and forge brazed.

Those who participated in the Gothic chest class will be constructing a lock to be affixed behind the front wall of the chest. Other students will make a lock which could be mounted on the exterior of any appropriately sized wooden chest. Register NOW!!

\*Nathan Robertson will be teaching another hammer class and possibly a drift class. The date is June 21 (& 22 if needed).

\*Roger Degner will be teaching a one day class on a Roycroft style jewelry box and a two day class on Roycroft cooper vessels. Be ready to hammer. Techniques learned will be forging, planishing, texturing, design application, lid construction soldering, and patina application. You can sign up for one or both classes. Class dates are June 27, 28 and 29.

\*Kirsten Styles will be teaching High Relief Chasing techniques on July 10<sup>th</sup>. 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>, 2008. In this workshop students will learn how to make their own high quality chasing tools and complete a chasing that incorporates extreme elevation shifts, fold overs, undercuts and highly textured surfaces. Thursday, students will create a set of ten chasing tools. Friday and Saturday we will move to pitch and smaller hammers to form our 5x5 inch relief images with chasing and repousse. We will explore the use of stakes to create larger images and repoussed' forms. All of the chasing and repousse work will be done cold with 18 bronze sheet(CDA655).






# Hammer-Making Workshop results in successful students


