The September Board Meeting:

The meeting was held at the home of Bob and Mary Fredell.

VP and recording sec. Pete Stanaitis was off with several other lucky people on the ABANA European Iron Tour, and as a result, his concise summary of the meeting isn't here. (But we're trying.)

In attendance: Dick Carlson, Dave Feterl, Mike Frattalone, Bob Johnson, Alexa Kelly, Gene Olson, Guy Patton

Guests: Ed Fasula, John Moriarty

The Meeting was called to order by Pres. Dave Feterl. Committee Reports were given, and all seemed well, preparations for the fall conference were just about finished. We still are looking for a venue for the Feb. Meeting. Treasurers report said the balance was well above where it was going into last years conference, but noted we have yet to make our big coal purchase and that when

we looked at the totals for publications and services returned to members it was close to what we took in as dues. We look healthy.

New Business:

Member, Ed Fasula, described and showed us some of the materials for the community outreach smithing classes he has been teaching. He wanted to find some way to put these classes under the Guild's insurance policy. These classes have been sponsored by another nonprofit not set up to handle classes such as these. After listening to his presentation, the board determined that the classes given were of value as community education into the nature of blacksmithing and looked like a good introduction to the process without the need for the sort of commitment the Guild's main education program requires. In other words, it answers some of the questions, what is blacksmithing, am I really interested? Dear Forum:

The Guild of Metalsmiths meeting on Wednesday evening leaves out anyone who does not reside in the Twin City area and that's quite a few of us. In fact, if you were to plot your membership on a map, I'd be surprised if more than 50% were NOT outside a hundred mile radius.

Personally I'm a full time blacksmith (metal artist, welder and farrier) and there is no way I'm losing four hours of work to attend a meeting (not to mention the 4 hours back) Maybe, just maybe, if it were on my only day off (Sunday) I could be persuaded to make the trip. As it is, I have difficulties attending seminars, conferences because I have to hire someone to be in the office on the days I'm gone.

One problem I've heard (or overhead conversations about) is the opinion that those of us who live more than 100 miles away are not considered when Guild business is discussed. Do you know our needs and interests?

I have only been a member for a year so I have no opinion, yet. But perhaps some polling or direct mailing would help dispel the notion that we are abandoned.

While I'm spending 33 cents, is there a list of sources for patinas? I am getting more and more requests for the "rusty" look. The only source I've found is A&C Distributors in Cal. And they seem quite high. Any help would be much appreciated.

There are a number of rust recipes that I pulled from some ArtMetal discussions on rust finish. I will put them together for the next "Metalsmith"

A quick summary is, clean the metal (acid or sandblast) then use standard drug store Hydrogen Peroxide with a tablespoonful or so of either acid or bleach to get it to rust. It may take several applications to get the color depth you want.

Clyde Wynia thinks the chlorine bleach rust is more orange and fragile.

And on your first point:

The Guild does try to do things out state and does sponsor and have some workshops/hammerins out side of the metro area. We have had hammerins in Baldwin, WI; workshops in Eau Claire, Stewartville, and Rochester and meetings south of Hastings, as well as in Nowthen and Anoka. We also cosponsor the Bemidji conference in the spring. Most of these activities have been initiated by members in those areas.

If you want an event in your area, do you have a venue in mind? What sort of thing would you like to see. One of the things we have been discussing is a school trailer with a tent top and 4 or 6 stations around it, this would allow us to take classes out state much more easily.

I started "The Forum" for the very reason that you state. We have a lot of members that participate mainly though our publications, and finding better ways to serve our members is part of the deal, I think. The Forum is an attempt to get more people involved. If you hear someone saying "that we could be doing a better job if only we would Suggest they write in to the forum, and float the idea to the membership. If they address it to The Forum, I will publish it. They could even use The Forum as a bulletin board for local planning as it is sometimes hard to keep track of what one's neighbors may be interested in when they are 100 miles away. If 6 - 10 of you find you have a common interest/problem and can find a mutually acceptable venue for a class or whatever, something may happen, and if there is a defined need, we can do what we can to help. Part of the problem we have is in the distances involved as you noted. Sometimes it is just too far to travel, but if we can get some of our activities happening up your way we may be able to get the active members in your area to carry the ball.

Ernie Dorrill, one of our farther flung members, is also on the Board of the Mississippi Forge Council. Ernie paid us a compliment the other day when he wrote to theforge, "We've also adopted the use of (borrowed from Gene Olson & Guild of Metalsmiths) a forum interim news update for our members that comes out periodically between newsletters or as needed. This is usually two to four pages front and back that

we can work up and distribute in two to threedays and can be carried by one stamp. We've discovered the better informed our membership is, the more enthusiasm and help can and will be generated. At present, there's too much happening within the Chapter for just a few individuals to handle."

There was a guy on theforge mailing list that noted "In any group, there are 10% of the people that do 95% of the work."

I mentioned this to Bob Fredell at the conference and he said,

"Hey, look around!

"Look at all the people that are involved here. Look at all the instructors we have teaching our workshops, all the volunteers that show up when we have a project that needs doing, all the people that have turned out to help set up and take down this conference. It's not just the same few people, there are lots of them. Not everybody is free to help all the time, but most people are willing to help when they can.

"One of the greatest strengths of this organization is the active participation of so many members."


And you know, I have to admit he's right. Thanks to all of you, for making this such a great friendly place to be.

THE PROJECTS

Through a grant from the Jerome Foundation, Illusion Theater is extending a Call for Artists to complete three projects in their newly renovated theater on the 8th floor of the Hennepin Center for the Arts.

Emerging artists are encouraged to apply for one or more of the commissions through the Submission of Qualifications. From the submissions, finalists will be chosen for each of the commissions. The finalists will be given a stipend to prepare an original design to be presented to the Selection Committee during two days of Final Review. The commissions will then be awarded in January, with installation scheduled for late winter-early spring of 2000. Commissioned artists will be given amounts listed below to complete the designs in Illusion Theater's 8th floor theater. All commissioned artists are responsible for all aspects of the commission, including materials, tools, and installation.

Window Grillwork Treatment (to include materials, installation and fees) \$14,000
Frieze Design (to include materials, installation and fees) \$5,000
Concession Area nad Lobby Wall Treatments (to include materials, installation and fees) \$7,000

The three areas identified for the competition are as follows:

WINDOW GRILLWORK: The first commission will be for an artist to design fourteen grills for the fourteen windows that surround Illusion Theater's eighth floor space. This grillwork will be installed in the windows with the dual purpose of giving the interior a specific shape and look and creating a surface and pattern of light to give the 8th floor a presence from the outside.

FRIEZE: The second commission is a painted frieze that will be along the perimeter of the walls of the 8th floor. This commission is inspired by the sculpted stone friezes that adorn the outside walls of the Hennepin Center for the Arts, originally built in 1888 as a Masonic Temple. The frieze will run approximately nine feet above the floor.

3. <u>MURAL</u>: In our new concession area there are a series of angled walls and a new corner of lobby space. We will commission artists to design a treatment that would bring this new space a unique look and focus.

LETTER OF INTEREST

The letter of interest must include the name, address, and telephone number of the applicant and intended project collaborators. Those interested in applying for more than one project must submit a separate letter of interest for each project.

CURRENT RESUME

The Guild of Metalsmiths will offer workshops in beginning basic blacksmithing designed for persons with little or no experience. In addition to teaching beginning blacksmithing, these workshops will assist persons to complete "Conquering The Basics, Unit #1" and "Beginning Projects, Unit #2" in *The Blacksmithing Study Guide*.

The Guild of Metalsmiths is continuing its program of offering workshops on beginning basic blacksmithing that comprehensively covers all of the basic blacksmithing processes. Our new associate instructors have recently completed a ten hour course on how to teach blacksmithing workshops. Some of our experienced instructors will be teaching this workshop for the forth time. Seldom will you find beginning basic blacksmithing workshops offered by an organization similar to The Guild of Metalsmiths as well planned and prepared as these.

The course of instruction.

Each workshop consists of four, all day sessions. The primary instructional emphasis is on the student learning and practicing the basic blacksmithing processes of fire control, drawing out, upsetting, punching, bending, twisting, splitting and heat treating. Safety is always stressed. In these workshops, we concentrate on practicing these basic blacksmithing processes rather than immediately making an item because the blacksmith must be well grounded in the basics.

As the workshop progresses from one session to the next, students will make one, or perhaps two, hand forged items requiring the skills they have learned.

The cost of a four session workshop varies depending your situation (see the other side.) The fee includes the following:

- 1. Shop rental fee, lights, heat, etc.
- 2. Use of most of the tools that you will need.
- 3. Coal and iron stock that you will need for the projects.
- 4. One copy of *The Blacksmithing Study Guide*. Exception-if you already have a copy of *The Blacksmithing Study Guide* you will not receive nor pay for a copy.

Please note – We cannot issue copies of *The Blacksmithing Study Guide* to non-members. Therefore, non-members are required to join The Guild of Metalsmiths.
