A Short report on the Fall conference for those who missed it.

The GoM fall conference (a.k.a. Metalsmith's Madness).

We migrated our separate ways on down to the conference South of Hastings on Friday. Hustle, bustle, lift, carry, pound, . . .

All those volunteers made short work of setup. Al Olson did a marvelous job of putting this all together. 
