


ever done by the foundry. He expects to do a casting in aluminum using the mould board, called the cope and drag system.


Guild educational grants





Bylaws vote at October 8 membership meeting

In early 2007 we published a copy of the current bylaws of the Guild of Metalsmiths in our quarterly publication, "The Metalsmith." These bylaws were originally written in 1978 and were later revised and amended in 1990. At that time it was noted by many members that the current bylaws do not really reflect how our organization operates or should operate. In the January 2008 issue of "The Forum" we reprinted these bylaws plus a proposed updated version developed by the Long Term Planning Committee under the leadership of Gary Myers and reviewed by the Board of Directors. We felt this updated version was a better match for the way our organization works and provides a better framework for us to use.

The proposed changes were put to a vote of the membership on February 13 and rejected. The current bylaws are available both on the website and in the January 2008 issue of "The Forum." In the September 2008 issue of "The Forum," the proposed changes were included—printed in cream color so they can easily be located and removed if you wish. Please read through them carefully.

The following letter to the membership from the Board of Directors and Officers reiterates our proposed changes to the current bylaws.

Please plan to attend the October 8 membership meeting in Northfield, where we will again vote on the proposed changes to the bylaws.

The following is a letter to the general membership of The Guild of Metalsmiths

To the members of The Guild of Metalsmiths:

In early 2007, the Board of Directors assigned the task of updating The Guild of Metalsmiths bylaws to the Long-term Planning Committee. The directions to this committee by the board were to review and clarify bylaws that were outdated, propose changes and make the document more relevant to the current membership.

The reviewing committee was comprised of the Long-term Planning Committee chair and vice-chair and a number of Guild members that volunteered their time to work on this important task. In late 2007 the committee presented their work to the Board of Directors. At a regularly scheduled meeting, the entire board spent more than two hours reviewing the document, seeking clarification from the committee on changes that were proposed, and making additional edits. The board approved document was then submitted to the membership at the February 2008 membership meeting for approval, at which time it was voted down.

When the board discussed the rejection by the membership of the proposed changes, your board, including its newly elected members, felt that the original proposal was a good package.

One issue that did concern the board was that no protocol was identified for conducting membership business meetings either in the current bylaws or in the proposed set. This was rectified by addition of procedures to the section titled "Meetings." Please take a moment to review this section prior to the next membership vote.

A second issue concerned the setting of the amount of annual dues. After considerable discussion, the board concluded that this should be a Board decision. The rationalization was that the membership has elected the Board to manage the affairs of The Guild. The directive in the current bylaws indicated that the duties of the Board include, but are not limited to, planning and staging activities for The Guild, contracting services, raising and disbursing funds, and conducting Guild business to best protect the interests and welfare of TGOM and its members. Based on this directive, it seems appropriate for the Board to be able to make a decision regarding the amount of dues based on budgetary and business needs of The Guild as they change over time.

The board does not take any of its management responsibilities lightly, and there is no reason to expect them to deal with the revision of the bylaws any differently.

An item posted on the Bellows expressed an opinion that the four officers' positions and the seven directors should all have a vote in board decision making. In reading the position descriptions in both the current bylaws (1979, amended 1990) and the proposed set, each group has a distinct role to play in managing TGOM, and those roles support, but do not overlap each other. The current board and officers feel that the two groups need to continue their work without overlap and possible conflict of interest. It is apparent that this was the consensus of the writers of the 1979 bylaws and the membership when it accepted the amended version in 1990.

We believe answers to other issues listed in the posting on the Bellows can be found in the proposed set of bylaws. It may take some re-reading, but the board feels that they are covered.

We all need to remember that this is a document that indicates who we are and what we are about, not how we conduct business. Too much operational detail in the bylaws makes them cumbersome and unwieldy. This document needs to be clean and relatively simple.

Please feel free to contact any of the board members if you have additional questions regarding these proposed changes.

THE GUILD OF METALSMITHS

Beginning Blacksmithing Workshops 2008-2009 Program Year

The Guild of Metalsmiths comprehensive workshop in beginning basic blacksmithing processes is designed for people with little or no experience. After completing the beginning blacksmithing workshop, the student will be able to complete Unit 1, "Conquering the Basics" and Unit 2, "Beginning Projects" in *The Blacksmithing Study Guide*.

Please note—We do not issue copies of *The Blacksmithing Study Guide* to non-members. Therefore, membership in the Guild of Metalsmiths is required in order to take the workshop.

The course of instruction

Each workshop consists of four all day sessions. The primary instructional emphasis is on the student learning and practicing the basic (also known as traditional) blacksmithing processes of fire control, drawing out, upsetting, punching, bending, twisting, slitting and heat-treating. Safety is always stressed. In these workshops, we concentrate on practicing the basic blacksmithing processes rather than immediately making an item because the blacksmith must be well grounded in the basics.

As the workshop progresses from one session to the next, students will make one, or perhaps two, hand forged items requiring use of the skills they have learned.

The cost of a four session workshop varies depending on your situation (see the registration form). The fee includes use of the tools that you will need, coal and iron stock that you will use, and a copy of *The Blacksmithing Study Guide* if you are a new member. Exception—if you already have a copy of *The Blacksmithing Study Guide*, you will not receive nor pay for a second copy.

Who are the students?

All are members of TGOM. The students come in all ages and experience. We have had ten -year olds and 70-year olds. There are always some women in each class also. Some students have never held a hammer before. Some students are skilled in other crafts and want to learn more about metal work. Some students are nearing retirement and want to learn a hobby. All share an interest in learning more about blacksmithing.

Typical Day:

Classes start at 9 but people usually show up much earlier to get the coffee brewing, have a donut, swap stories, or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on. We break for lunch. You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant.
