Friday:

Friday afternoon is the Gallery setup. Bring your best works to show off all of the great stuff you have made. This is a non-juried show; all items registered will be included in the gallery. If you have items that you showed in the past, please bring them again since there are always new members each year for which the items will be fresh. If you cannot make it Friday, gallery registration is open on Saturday also.

Friday night is the gala opening of the gallery. Come early for the potluck dinner at 5:30 and join your friends to tour the wonders of the conference gallery. After dinner there will be presentations by the demonstrators.

Friday is also the opening of the tailgate area. If you need to buy or sell some equipment, the tailgate sales area is a great opportunity to exchange that hard-to-find smithin' stuff. Sales are open all weekend, but you are warned that the best deals usually go early.

Saturday:

Saturday is the main event with registration starting at 7:30 AM and demonstrations starting at 9 AM. This year we have two wonderful demonstrators. Doug Wilson is from Little Deer Isle, Maine. Learn how to build and bake in a stacked brick oven



Beginners Blacksmithing Classes 2010 / 2011

When: Classes are held on four Saturdays from 9 – 4. Three sets of classes are held this Fall, Winter and Spring. All 3 sets of classes teach the same information. You can choose either the A, B or C set of classes.

A Class	B Class	<u>C Class</u>
Oct. 9	Jan 8	Feb 12

Nov. 6	Jan 22	Mar 12
Nov. 20	Jan 29	Mar 26

Cost: First, you must be a member. If you are not, you can join for \$30 per year. The workbook/study guide is \$15 and the 4 classes are \$105. This covers everything you need, the facility, coal, and metal.

Where: The classes are held at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing, 6250 Riverdale Dr NW, just off Hwy 10 in Anoka near the Anoka Vocational College. See map on page 5.

Why take the beginners basic classes: The beginners basic classes are designed to give everyone the same understanding of the basics, techniques and terminology. The basic classes are required before taking any of the many other classes the Guild offers. This enables those classes to concentrate on advanced techniques without having to spend time on basic concepts.

What you need to bring: Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs an suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal.

Tools: Bring your favorite hammer. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable. We have all the punches, chisels and tools you will be using but feel free to bring your own tools if you have them.

What you will learn: The first 3 Saturdays you will learn the basic techniques including:

Safety	Forging Dynamics	Hammer Techniques	Fire Building
Drawing out	Upsetting	Punching	Bending
Twisting	Heat Treating	Scrolling	Splitting

The fourth Saturday will be self paced to build a few items that will include each of the techniques you learned earlier. Instructors will help guide you thru any number of possible projects. This is a good opportunity to try out all your new skills.

Who are the teachers: The instructors are all volunteers with a wide range of experience, talent, and stories. They range from just finishing the basic beginners class to 30 years experience. There is usually at least one instructor for every two students and many times we have had as many instructors as students.

Who are the students: The students come in all ages and experience. We have had 10 year olds and 70 year olds. There are always a few women in each class. Some students have never held a hammer before. Some students are skilled in other crafts, woodworking, glass, welding, pottery and want to learn more about metal work to work it into their craft. Some students are nearing retirement and want to learn a hobby. All share an interest in learning more about blacksmithing.

Typical day: Classes start at 9 but people usually show up much earlier to get the coffee brewing, have a donut, swap stories or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on to show. We break for lunch. You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant.





News from Tunnel Mill


Tunnel Mill is located 85-100 miles south of the Twin Cities in the country five miles north of Spring Valley, MN on County Road 1.

October 8, 9, 10 MOVING METAL WITH MUSCLE – Forging a Stake Anvil by Hand

Participants in this Tom Latane' class will work in pairs striking for each other to produce a small stake anvil for each. To begin the process a collar will be forge welded around the lower part of the vertical stem (1 ½ " square mild steel).

The horizontal portion (also 1 ½" square) will be forged to a taper on both ends and forge welded to a tenon welded on top of the stem. Reinforcing cheeks will be welded across this joint on either side. The anvil face will be forged from



leaf spring and welded along the top of the two horns, after which they will be forged to final shape. The spring steel face should be hard enough without heat treating. The reinforcing cheeks will offer space for touch marks, initials, or decorative ornamentation.

Announcing the Francis Whitaker Blacksmith Scholarship

Two \$700 scholarships will be available for the Traditional Joinery Projects class at the John C. Campbell Folk School, November 7 - 12, 2010 taught by Clay Spencer. This scholarship is for **intermediate and advanced** students who have a solid foundation in basics, can manage a coal fire, and forge weld.

Interested blacksmiths should supply the following information and mail it to Clay Spencer at 73 Penniston Private Drive, Somerville, AL 35670. Contact Clay at 256-558-3658 or clay@otelco.net if you have any questions:

- 1. Name, address, e-mail and phone number
- 2. Describe your blacksmithing experience, how many years, classes taken, jobs, kind of work you do, how many hours you blacksmith in an average month.
- 3. Goals for your blacksmithing career, what you wish to do as a blacksmith
- 4. Make a scale drawing of a proposed project (your original drawing not copied from another source), should show 2 or 3 views with stock sizes and specify proposed joinery. Include a cut list for the stock. This does not have to be the project actually made in the class.
- 5. Describe your participation in the blacksmithing community: teaching, demonstrating, craft shows, writing articles, belonging to and attending local groups, attending conferences
- 6. Explain why you need a scholarship to attend a class
- 7. Do you sell blacksmithing items you make? What type items? How do you sell?
- 8. Include at least 3, no more than 5, photos of some of your work.

The completed application should be mailed no later than September 30, 2010.

Successful applicants will be notified by October 15, 2010. The money will be paid directly to the Folk School. You will be responsible for all other costs such as fuel fee, materials, transportation, etc. You are requested to write a 2 page article explaining some of the blacksmithing techniques used in making your project, (include some photos or sketches) and send it to your state organization.
