

Don't miss your chance to see these masters at work.

Tom Latane' is a familiar face to the Guild of Matalsmiths, not to mention a nationally-known master smith. Tom lives in Pepin, WI with his wife, Catherine (Kitty). They share a shop that's been going strong for 28 years. As an artist-blacksmith, he has been using traditional tools and techniques of forging, chasing, repousse', and whitesmithing to create original locks, hardware, trademan's tools, coffers and chests, hearth and light fixtures. At the conference Tom will share what he learned in November, 2010 about forging traditional Norwegian edge tools while he worked with Havard Bergland in Norway for two weeks on a grant funded by Maihaugen Museum in Lillehammer, Norway, the Guild of Metalsmiths, and the Badger Blacksmiths.

Brian Brazeal began as a farrier and has been blacksmithing for 30 years. He was resident blacksmith at Mission San Juan Capistrano for five years, attended his first blacksmithing conference in California in 1998, and has been teaching and sharing techniques ever since. Brian's demonstrations often cover "tools to make tools," fine hot collaring work, bundle forge welded, riveting, forge welding, trivets, hooks, tongs, animal heads, and a "forged to finish" hammer emphasizing clean work and hammer control. Brian and his wife Karen live in Brandon, Mississippi.

Beginners Blacksmithing Classes 2011 / 2012

When: Classes are held on four Saturdays from 9-4. Three sets of classes are held this Fall, Winter and Spring. All 3 sets of classes teach the same information. You can choose either the A, B or C set of classes.

A Class	B Class	C Class

Cost: First, you must be a member. If you are not, you can join for \$30 per year. The workbook/study guide is \$15 and the 4 classes are \$105. This covers everything you need, the facility, coal, and metal.

Where: The classes are held at the Minnesota School of Horseshoeing, 6250 Riverdale Dr NW, just off Hwy 10 in Anoka near the Anoka Vocational College. See map on page 5.

Why take the beginners basic classes: The beginners basic classes are designed to give everyone the same understanding of the basics, techniques and terminology. The basic classes are required before taking any of the many other classes the Guild offers. This enables those classes to concentrate on advanced techniques without having to spend time on basic concepts.

What you need to bring: Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs an suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal.

Tools: Bring your favorite hammer. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable. We have all the punches, chisels and tools you will be using but feel free to bring your own tools if you have them.

What you will learn: The first 3 Saturdays you will learn the basic techniques including:

Safety Forging Dynamics Hammer Techniques Fire Building
Drawing out Upsetting Punching Bending
Twisting Heat Treating Scrolling Splitting

The fourth Saturday will be self paced to build a few items that will include each of the techniques you learned earlier. Instructors will help guide you thru any number of possible projects. This is a good opportunity to try out all your new skills.

Who are the teachers: The instructors are all volunteers with a wide range of experience, talent, and stories. They range from just finishing the basic beginners class to 30 years experience. There is usually at least one instructor for every two students and many times we have had as many instructors as students.

Who are the students: The students come in all ages and experience. We have had 10 year olds and 70 year olds. For students under 18 there needs to be a parent present. There are always a few women in each class. Some students have never held a hammer before. Some students are skilled in other crafts, woodworking, glass, welding, pottery and want to learn more about metal work to work it into their craft. Some students are nearing retirement and want to learn a hobby. All share an interest in learning more about blacksmithing.

Typical day: Classes start at 9 but people usually show up much earlier to get the coffee brewing, have a donut, swap stories or show off recent projects. Feel free to bring projects you are working on to show. We break for lunch. You can either bring a brown bag or go out to a local fast food restaurant.

October Guild meeting set!



In this forge welding class students will gain a better understanding of the process of forge welding. We will dispel some of the myths that seem to follow this art. Students will learn the basics of forge welding as well as make some cool stuff.

Students should bring tongs, hammer, brain, safety glasses & ear plugs. Other safety equipment may include gloves, leather apron, cotton clothing, leather shoes.

Handled Struck Tool Class

Saturday, October 29, 2011 MN School of Horseshoeing

Class fee: \$65

Instructor: Jesse Gavin with helpers Herb Fick and Guy Paton

Description: The tools made will be a punch with a wire handle, a chisel with a wire handle and a small hammer. The punch and chisel are used to make the hammer. Steel will be 5/8 inch round 1045 for the punches and chisel and for the hammer one inch square 4140 or 4150. Material may be substituted. The exercise will include basic heat treatment of the punch chisel and hammer. Forge in the morning and heat treat after lunch. We will



not get the handle in the hammer. We will put in the eye. (Not enough time.) We will use treadle hammer and basic blacksmithing tools including tongs. Learn to fill your tool kit! And learn to make tools for the annual conference rarffle toolbox.

Safety equipment: safety glasses & earplugs are mandatory.

Other equipment: basic forging hammer, hammer for striking tools, gloves


