February 2026 Membership Meeting to be held at Northrup King Building Art Space, Minneapolis, MN, Feb. 7, 2026

February's Membership Meeting will be on SATURDAY, February 7, 2026 from noon to 4:00pm. Location: Northrup King & Co. located at 1500 Jackson St NE, Minneapolis, MN. The meeting will be in the 3rd floor gallery, followed by a potluck and show-n-tell. There is parking in front of the building.

Northrup King Building is the Art Organization. Includes artists from about 11 different buildings in Northeast Minneapolis. The building is open from noon to 4 on Saturdays. There are lots of studios that are open during that timeframe. Some are just galleries, and some also include working studio.

Mary Schwartz will give a demonstration on lampworking. She uses a torch to create glass beads.

History of Northrup King Building

The Northrup King Building is actually a complex of 10 buildings first constructed in 1917.

Originally built for and occupied by the Northrup King & Co. seed company, its location adjoining two sets of railroad tracks made it the ideal place to ship seeds across the United States. Northrup King & Co. occupied the building until the late 1980s, when it was sold to Jim Stanton of Shamrock Properties.

Through an ongoing process of renovation, Stanton and his daughter Debbie Woodward (Property Manager from 2001 - 2018) turned the Northrup King Building into the creative center of over 350 artists and arts-related businesses that you know today.

The building was sold to Artspace Projects, Inc. upon Woodward's retirement.



Class Description: This years tongs are what I'm calling pipe tongs. They will hold pipe of nearly any size by one edge vs having one for each size of pipe that you might work with. They will also hold just about any size material.

FYI – these work really well for working on bells once the end has been flared out, as the jaws will reach over and not damage the flaring as you work on the rest of the bell.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the class: favorite hammer, ball peen hammer, tongs to hold 3/8" – ½" round, files

Safety Equipment: the usual for forging with coal: gloves, safety glasses, hearing protection, clothing of natural fiber with no cuffs or fraying, and leather boots or shoes.

Other Equipment: We will bring belt sander, torch, and specialty tooling to make one of the jaws.

Introduction to Forge Welding 2026

Date and time: Saturday February 28, 9 am - 4 pm

Location: MN School of Horseshoeing (map page 7)

Instructor: Peter Ellison

Class Size: Maximum 8 Cost: \$100

Class Description:

Starting with how to manage the fire for forge welding and some basic discussion of the theory of forge welding. Jump right into the first project of making a simple flux spoon with a fold over forge weld. Then work on a fireplace poker that is built up with lots of different forge welds including joining two bars, a basket twist, and a collar weld.

Depending on the time available: welding chain, welding mild steel to high carbon steel. The goal of this class is to walk away confident forge welding is something that can be done, and how to troubleshoot the inevitable issues that come up. Basic forging skills needed.

Tools and Equipment or other items participants are to bring to the class: Favorite hammer and tongs for 3/8 round if you have them.

Safety Equipment: Bring safety glasses and appropriate clothing the usual for forging with coal: safety glasses, hearing protection, clothing of natural fiber with no cuffs or fraying, and leather boots or shoes.

What you need to bring: Eye, ear and skin protection. This includes safety glasses, ear muff or plugs and suitable clothing which includes hard shoes, cotton or leather. Synthetic and polyester clothing will burn and melt. There will be sparks and brushes against hot metal.

Tools: Tools are provided but if you have a favorite hammer, punches, chisels and tools, bring them along. A small 1 to 2 pound ball peen hammer would work. We have various hammers for you to try and get a feel for what is comfortable.

Lunch: Bring lunch. Shop is in rural Janesville. Bring plenty of water to keep hydrated during the event.




